**HANDICRAFTS BRANCH**

(Continued from Page One.)

At first the work done by the Branch comprised chiefly hooking, beading and lace. Since that basket and pottery-making had been taken up, and the realization of the value of the handicrafts being held in these branches of work at seed fairs, and they afterwards became an annual affair. The Guild was well received by the management of the seed fairs, and all available space was given and arrangements made for the showing of exhibits. In addition to this the Guild's shop at the seed fair shows an exhibit from the Montreal shop as a demonstration of what can be done in this work. In 1914, the first year the Guild "opened shop" it forwarded to Montreal \$192.47, and in 1915, \$176; and up to the present in 1916 the sales amount to \$150. Miss Hunt, in the course of her address, said that in comparing the work of the local artists a superior, especially in the light of this kind of work, the Guild was anxious to establish a rug industry.

Miss Hunt's address was very interesting and gave an excellent idea of the possibilities of such an institution as the Handicrafts Guild.

It may be explained that a member can use the Guild as a means of disposing of her work. A member may make articles and donate them to the Guild without personal pecuniary advantage.

After some discussion Mrs. Mathison moved that a branch of the Guild be formed in Charlottetown. The motion was carried and a nominating committee was appointed consisting of Mrs. J. A. Mathison, Miss Katherine McLeod, Mrs. Ledwell, Mrs. George Warburton, and Mrs. George Auld. On their recommendation the following officers were elected:—President, Mrs. D. Davis; 1st Vice-President, Mrs. Chas. Lyons; 2nd Vice-President, Mrs. George Warburton; 3rd Vice-President, Mrs. Tidmarsh. Executive committee—Mrs. S. R. Jenkins; Mrs. Full; Mrs. J. O. Hyndman; Mrs. George Auld; Miss McLeod; Mrs. Hearty; Mrs. W. Owen.

On the motion of Mr. Pope, seconded by Miss McLeod, a hearty vote of thanks was tendered to Mrs. Mathison and Hunt, after which the meeting came to a close.

The following are the terms and conditions regarding the formation of branches of the Guild:—

1. Ten members, at least, shall be required to form a Branch. That number sub-committees may be formed, paying fees directly to the general fund through the treasurer.

2. Each Branch shall be asked to contribute a sum fixed by itself to the general fund, to assist in covering the extra expenses incurred in printing, postage, Secretarial work, etc., etc.

3. There shall be some person, possibly the Secretary, appointed at each Branch, satisfactory to both the Branch and the General Committee, who shall be authorized Agent of the Guild, such agent to make quarterly statements to the General Committee. In all cases where it is proposed to open "Handicrafts Shops" special arrangements will have to be made.

4. There shall be a periodical inspection of all Branches.

5. The President of a Branch shall be ex-officio, a member of the General Committee, and if unable to be present at its meetings, shall have the right to appoint any member of that Committee to act as proxy.

6. The above conditions are subject to re-consideration at the end of the year.

**Racing Man Robbed Of Cash and Gems**

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

MONTREAL, September 12.—Sam Louis, a well-known horseman, his wife, were held up in their apartment in the Beachmont section of the Grove apartment house in Lennox avenue, on Saturday, and robbed of diamonds to the value of \$2,500 and \$1,500 in cash. The robbers first entered the apartment at 6.30 o'clock Saturday afternoon, while Mrs. Louis was alone. They robbed her of \$2,500 worth of diamonds after which they tied her up and locked her in a room of the apartment. It was two men, who posed as water inspectors who robbed Mrs. Louis. They told, after Mrs. Louis had opened the door in response to a ring of the bell, that they had come to inspect the water pipes and had been through the other apartments. The moment they got inside the door, they sized Mrs. Louis, one of the men placing his hand over her mouth. They took away from her rings she was wearing on her fingers and after they had gagged and bound her went through the apartment and gathered up other articles of jewelry.

When the two men had gone through the apartment and had taken every article of jewelry of any value that they could find they carried Mrs. Louis into a rear room and shut the door.

An hour and a quarter later, at 6.45 o'clock, when Mr. Louis came home from Blue Bonnets, where his horse, St. Charles, won the last race, and unlocked the door of his apartment, which is on the second floor, he was sized by two men, while a third man, who had followed him up the stairway, came at the back of him. Mr. Louis had seen the man on the stairway but thought he was going to one of the other apartments in the building. One of the men inside, both of whom wore masks, placed the barrel of a revolver to Mr. Louis' stomach and forced him to hold up his hands, while the other two stripped him of his diamonds, valued at about \$2,000, and took from his pockets \$1,500 in cash. Before leaving him and with the revolver still pressed to his stomach, one of the robbers warned Mr. Louis that if he heard of his reporting the robbery to the police, they would come back and "croak" himself and his wife. When they were going out the door, they told Mr. Louis that he would find his wife all right in a back room. The moment the door closed behind the thieves, Mr. Louis ran to the rear of the apartment, where he found his wife, bound and gagged, as the thieves had told him.

The robbery had evidently been planned with care by those familiar with Mr. Louis' movements.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

Entry—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Five dollars per acre, of three years' residence after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homesteaded right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Five dollars per acre, of three years' residence after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation.
