

# Bimelech Is Favorite To Cop Pimlico Futurity And End The Season Undeclared

NEW YORK, Oct. 18—(AP)—This loud horse laugh rolling out of Col. E. R. Bradley's stables these fall mornings comes from Bimelech, the Colonel's two-year-old champion, thinking what he can do to old Jim and all his pet turf traditions.

It isn't just one Jim Bimelech can break this year and next. There's a long list provided the son of Black Tony keeps right on developing.

So far this year, Col. Bradley's Biblical-named colt has won \$101,860. He took the Belmont Futurity handily, thereby ending the limx which has always dogged Bradley hopefuls in that stake. Although he had the betting favorite on several occasions, the Colonel's colors never before entered the winner's circle.

Now that Andy K. has been retired for the season, there seems nothing to stand in the way of Bimelech's bid to become the first undefeated season in the Pimlico Futurity Nov. 4 and the New England Futurity at Narragansett.

# Gyroscope & Orichalque Split Honors

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 18—(AP)—Mrs. H. Leader's gyroscope and the Marquess of Dufferin's Orichalque won the honors in the Cambridge handicap, the first major race to be run since the outbreak of war.

Under ideal racing conditions a good crowd thickly dotted with uniforms turned out to see the historic race run in two sections, with the Gyroscope, because of the unusually large field. Due to cancellation of the customary acceptance regulations the original entry was almost intact and 27 horses faced the starter in each section.

Gyroscope, a three-year-old colt, by Sir Walter Raleigh out of Girasole, finished in a drive in the first heat to nip his rival by a neck with Hot Bun II third by four lengths. All three horses were quoted at 100 to 6 in the most open betting the Cambridge has ever known.

In the second section Orichalque, a six-year-old horse by Pinceau out of Mine d'Or, won handsily by a length from Mrs. A. Bendis's Quaker Maitre with Never Surprised third 1-2 lengths further back. Orichalque returned 25 to 1 while Quaker Maitre was quoted at 100 to 8 and Never Surprised at 20 to 1. The race, reduced from 1-3 miles to a mile was run over the July course as the winter circuit is being used for military purposes.

# Rookie Centre For Popular Leaf Line

ST. CATHARINES, Ont., Oct. 18—(AP)—Coach Dick Irvin placed Lex Chisholm at centre between Pep Kelly and Murphy Chamberlain today on a forward line that might possibly open the National League season as a unit for Toronto Maple Leafs today. The blues won 13-4, Gordie Drillon scoring three straight goals at one point and Don Metz two straight for the winners.

Chisholm, signed to a professional contract by the Leafs near the end of last season, finished out the campaign with Syracuse in the International-American League. Before that he led the Ontario Hockey Association senior series in point-making as a member of the Oshawa Club.

The Leafs divided into teams of "Blues" and "Whites" today for a practice game that saw Nick Metz play on a line with his brother, Don, and Red Heron. The blues won 13-4, Gordie Drillon scoring three straight goals at one point and Don Metz two straight for the winners.

# McGill Quits League Because Of The War

MONTREAL, Oct. 18—(CP)—McGill University's hockey team will withdraw from the Quebec senior hockey league this season because of the war, it was announced today following a meeting of the University Senate. The Reds will continue, however, to play in the International Intercollegiate League.

The senate adopted a physical education committee report saying that "because the international crisis demands that students should spend as much time as possible in preparation for this emergency, it is deemed unwise for students in the university to participate in this season's scheduled games conducted under the jurisdiction of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association."

U. N. B. it was somewhat of a different story with the Saints losing 16-3 but the local University squad were loud in their praise of the Fredericton team and figure they will be the team to beat at the western section title and a spot in the finals against the Nova Scotia winners.

Favoured with the wind and sun at their backs in the first half Fr. Fredericton the Saints held the advantage throughout and had the ball in play for the greater part of the time. But the Red and Black had the better of the second half in which they scored four tries and converted two of them.

The club made final preparations for its exhibition tour against New York Americans at a meeting and announced replacements for the two forward positions open on the lineup would be decided during the six games. Rangers leave tomorrow for the opening game in Port Arthur Oct. 20.
