The latest news first of all. Shipping was quite dull at the City water front Saturday. There was shooting practice at Kensington Range Saturday. Miss Ella Martin, teacher, Bethel, Lot 48, was a passenger from this City Saturday. Mrs. Harry D. Lowther, North Carleton, was in the City Saturday and returned home by the afternoon train. W. C. and Mrs. Wauchops of Richmond, Virginia, will spend the winter with her father Rev. D. B. McLeod of Orwell.

The warmest registered Saturday was thirty four and the coldest, at nine o'clock in the evening, twenty seven degrees.

William McAfee, wife and family, and his brother Farquhar, have returned from Providence, R. I., where they had been residing, to Bonshaw, where they will make their home.

The A. W. Perry will arrive in this port tomorrow morning and will sail on return during the afternoon. There is a possibility of this boat making another trip if freight warrants it.

The political meeting at Bonshaw Friday night was well attended. John McManus presided. The speakers in the order named were Messrs. Simpson, Smith, Kennedy, Sinclair, Myers and Crosby.

Sackville Tribune says:—Many tons of smelts are now being shipped to the United States from points along the N. B. and P. E. railway. Last Friday 600 boxes were loaded on the Maritime Express, which was delayed sixteen minutes in consequence. About 2,000 boxes have been shipped by Canadian express during the last four or five days.

Saturday the western train which should have arrived in this city about twelve o'clock did not arrive till three. The reason for the delay was that the engine leaked badly from Tignish to Summerside so that the train only crawled along. At Summerside another engine was procured and the remainder of the journey was a little faster.

A wild runaway occurred on Queen Street Saturday afternoon. Two horses harnessed to two truckwagons took fright near Prowse Bros store and ran swiftly down Queen Street, one running down C. Lyon's wharf, with a shaft of the wagon broken and the other turned up Water Street upsetting the wagon. Both were captured without any noticeable injury done to them.

The window of W. S. Brown's grocery store on the corner of Great George and Kent Street has been most favorably commented upon during the past week. It is most artistically decorated with packages of Union Blend tea arranged to form an old fashioned fire place. There then is a daintily spread table seated around which are a number of dolls making a most desirable display.

It was a dangerous night for a fire to burst forth on account of the high wind. The firemen were as usual very prompt and in a few minutes the corner of Weymouth and Fitzroy streets was crowded with eager people.
