ANNAPOLIS, Md., May 5—(AP)—The bills were returned by the Supreme Court Grand Jury today in two indictments charging theft and perjury against W. A. Livingstone of Vancouver, former Judge of County Court district No. 3 in Nova Scotia.

The theft indictment listed three alleged defalcations while the accused was executor of the estate of Harvey Hudson of Lewis Grandville, N.S. They totalled \$3,700.

The perjury indictment charged Livingstone, executor of the estate of Mrs. Hardwick, with making securities worth around \$80,000 in the estate at the time of her death and later stated the money was gone before she died.

When the grand jury was called for arraignment his counsel, George C. Nowlan, read an affidavit from a British Columbia doctor

worked on aircraft batteries and predictors, and was asked what the possibility was for Canadian women being used in activities more closely associated with actual fighting.

"As to training and handling weapons or munitions," the minister said, "when I was on the factory floor as an officer in charge of the searchlight battery mentioned to me that he believed members of the W. A. C. would be able to do that sort of work admirably."

The minister told another questioner that no women doctors had yet been appointed to the corps but he expected they would be very soon.

Before routine proceedings were taken up Prime Minister Mackenzie King announced that an office of "director of censorship" had been set up, headed by Col. C. M. Biggar, K. C., Ottawa, chairman of the Canadian section of the Canada-United States permanent joint defence committee.

This will bring all censorship activities including press, radio, postal cable and telegraph under one director with the responsibility to the Minister of National War Services.

Mr. King said Col. Biggar would continue to act as Canadian chairman of the Defence Council.

During the course of the afternoon's discussion Pensions Minister Mackenzie announced that for some time the officers of his department had been considering a "national fitness" program to improve the health of potential war workers, but he could not make a definite statement at the moment.

Dr. Herbert Bruce (Con. Toronto) suggested the authorities should make compulsory that all bread produced in Canada for those in the services as well as for civilians, should be made of the finest wheat now being produced under a new system which permits retention of the essential vitamins contained in the wheat. Such vitamins are more potent and valuable than any that could be produced synthetically, he said.

Cereals, potatoes, peanut butter and milk were other rich sources of vitamins for growing children and adults as well, Dr. Bruce said.

Mr. Bruce also advocated wide extension of the army personnel selection system to cover all three branches of the armed forces, and that some thousands of men whose names are on the waiting list for the navy and air force to be brought into the service.

High school and college students will be given permits to work in non-essential industries during summer vacations but not for a longer period than 10 weeks, Mr. Bruce said during the discussion of the war appropriation bill.

He said, however, that where men were employed in munitions factories, it was desirable that students be employed in the war jobs rather than in non-essential industries.

The minister was answering complaints made last night by private members who said students 17 and
