Chamberlain Says Flooding Caused Submarine Disaster

Gives Official Account Of Tragedy To House Of Commons — Promises "Full Public Inquiry" Into Sinking Of Thetis With Loss Of 99 Men.

LONDON, June 5—(CP)—Promising a "full public inquiry" into the sinking of the submarine Thetis, Prime Minister Chamberlain rose personally in the House of Commons today to give an official account of the disaster. He presented a full description of the accident "so far as the facts are yet known" and stated that as far as can be ascertained the sinking of the Thetis last Thursday with the loss of 99 to the 103 men aboard "was caused by flooding of the two forward compartments through one of the bow torpedo tubes."

Washington Agog Over Royal Visit

WASHINGTON, June 5—(CP)—Growing more excited with each passing minute, Washington today with last-minute preparations to receive King George and Queen Elizabeth. Up and down Pennsylvania Avenue bits of bustling began appearing, hinting only at the gay decorations which will adorn the route on Thursday, when Their Majesties ride in state from Union Station to the White House.

Italian Demands Rejected By Suez Canal Directors

POSSIBILITY KING GEORGE OF OCTOBER NO STRANGER ELECTION SEEN TO MARITIMES

Announcement Is Expected From Prime Minister Early In August. Provinces Rich In History Plan Great "Bon Voyage" Reception.

OTTAWA, June 5—With Parliament prorogued and members off to their homes, political chatter in Ottawa is awaiting the announcement of a general election which opinion indicates should come about the middle of October. Prime Minister Mackenzie King holds the answer to this question and the belief here is that it will be given about Aug. 8 next when he will be guest of honor at a dinner given in Toronto by his supporters throughout the Dominion.

Pope Renews Efforts For World Peace

VATICAN CITY, June 5—Informed Vatican sources said tonight Pope Pius XII had renewed his efforts to promote peaceful solution of Europe's controversies. The Pope conferred with the British Minister to the Holy See, Francis Osborne, and Vatican sources said he had dispatched separate messages to London, Paris, Berlin, Rome and Warsaw in which he sought to indicate a definite way out of problems perplexing European statesmen.
