Economic Confederation.—Prof. McPhee asserted that a chief aim of the Association was to help work out economic Confederation within the confines of political confederation. It did not intend to bring the Maritimes something for nothing, but to point out ways in which increased trade could be carried on with Central Canada to the advantage of both sections. Ontario, he said, was as anxious to import from the east as the Maritimes.

"We hope," he said, in speaking of the freight rate problems, "that you will create such a balance of trade moving from the Maritime Provinces to Central Canada that it would be in the interest of the people concerned to alter any factors now operating against the Maritime producers."

Mr. Burnaby said there was a real need in Ontario for Maritime material other than the hams and prods from which had been drawn so many of that province's foremost men. He thought such problems as freight rates and the tariff were to be worked out by the Maritimes themselves. Mr. Saunders announced that five prominent Toronto business men, not from the Maritimes had joined the Association of Trade with the Eastern Provinces.

The Association's expectations for the furthering of the tourist traffic including the institution of a through pullman from Toronto to Halifax were outlined by Mr. Pyke.

The members of the Nova Scotia legislature, of the Halifax City Council, Mayors of the Nova Scotia towns and representatives of the Halifax and Provinces newspapers attended the dinner. Premier E. N. Rhodes, Hon. J. F. Mahoney, John Murphy, Hon. J. J. Kinley, R. T. Smith, M. P., spoke briefly.

MILLIONS LOST BY FRENCH INVESTORS

(Special to The Guardian)

PARIS, Dec. 5.—A gigantic swindle resulting in losses to "investors" of perhaps \$20,000,000 schooled in the Chamber of Deputies today and in the cabinet. Two arrests have been made. The affair got into the Chamber of Deputies when M. Chastenet, socialist, member from Iser asked Premier Poincaré "what measures he intended to take to prevent similar occurrences in the future," the member adding that he stood ready to name two cabinet ministers who were closely interested in financial companies of a character "not unlike that which has just collapsed."

M. Poincaré refused to discuss the status of his involved ministers. He did however, say that sterner supervision was being created for the control of such projects. Thousands

of men and women, a majority of them from the poorer classes, stood outside and at times menacingly intruded into the offices of the Gazette du Commerce today. The newspaper was a subsidiary of financial companies organized in all the large cities and the crowds were clamoring for reimbursement of lost "investments."

The case promised to develop into one of the greatest blows to French savings that have been delivered since the Panama canal scandal. Expert accountants who have been examining the books of Mme. Martha Hanau, aged 42, and her former husband and present business partner, Lazare Bloch, estimated that the estate had caused losses of from 150,000,000 to 500,000,000 francs. The latter figure would represent about \$20,000,000.

The speaker remarked in closing that although he had seen wonderful sights in the old country, owing to the fact that civilization began there almost two thousand years ahead of ours, still nothing could rival the magnificence of the scene of the historic ramparts and city of Quebec, as it came into view on the arrival of the liner on his return to Canada. He had roamed mid pleasures and palaces and found along with the vast fund of information gleaned while so doing, that after all there is no place like Home and Canada.
