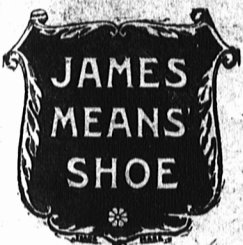

There are many friends of John Ross, Gratton Street, who will regret to learn that he is not very well.

The Mint leaves for Picout this morning with passengers, mails, one cartload of freight and eighteen horses.

Yesterday morning at the Police Court the Prohibition case against William McCallum was adjourned for a week. The drunk Jas. McIsaac, was fined four dollars or fifteen days.

Judge MacDonald left yesterday afternoon for Summerside, on his way to Montreal from where he shall probably extend his trip to the Pacific coast and perhaps to the Southern States.

Quit a number of passengers have left the City, the past two days by the afternoon train for Summerside in order to cross to Picout by the S. S. Empress which leaves Summerside at 6 o'clock each morning, the early departure being compelled on account of the ice which still persists in floating about the straits.

The new railway station and its surroundings begin to show signs of a completed condition. The dummy, which formerly existed in the rear of the new station has been all-filled in and levelled and completely changes the appearance of that part of the City. Work is energetically proceeding also upon the new workshops in the railway yard, which are beginning to look quite imposing.

At the armouries last night Colonel Dawson on behalf of the officers of the 4th Regiment, Canadian Artillery, presented Adjutant Carvell, who leaves shortly for Montreal, with a smoking set to mark their appreciation of a brother officer who so long has been identified with the regiment. Short speeches expressive of the appreciative regard in which Adjutant Carvell is held, were made by the officers present to which a suitable reply was made. The proceedings terminated by all present joining heartily in singing "For he's a jolly good fellow."

There have been fifteen nominations made of employees of the I. C. R. for election as commissioners of the Provident Fund Board, the election for which takes place on Monday. One of those nominated is Peter McQuaid, of the P. E. I. Railway, Charlottetown. There are five persons on the Board, one is the General Manager, two are appointed from time to time by the Minister and two are elected by the employees. The Board has the administration of a large fund, which provides life allowances to such as are entitled thereto under the Act, which came into force last month.

The lecture on Cardinal Newman by Dr. R. F. Quigley, K. C. of Saint John brought out a goodly assembly of citizens to the Lyceum Hall last evening. A number of clergymen were among those present. Editor McIsaac presided with dignity and acceptance. The lecturer gave at the outset and as a historical setting a graphic word picture of the times in England in 1801 when Cardinal Newman first saw the light, and traced his growth and development mentally and religiously through his school and college days, his career as a priest of the Anglican Church, the Tractarian movement of which he was so active a promoter, his conversion to the Roman Catholic faith, his subsequent promotion to the Cardinalate, until his death at a rare old age in 1890.

Many of the questions raised from the poetical and prose writings of the eminent Cardinal were quoted. The lecturer occupied an hour and three quarters, although Dr. Quigley read very rapidly in his quiet, earnest manner. It was a finished and scholarly production, broad and liberal in tone with many ornate passages. His rapid reading afforded no opportunities for demonstrations of applause during the lecture by his admiring auditory, but at the close there was a spontaneous outburst of cheering which was renewed again and again. Dr. Quigley is naturally a great admirer of Cardinal Newman, also a close student of his writings, and few are more capable of presenting in attractive form the life and characteristics of the great churchman. The vote of thanks was moved by Dr. Caven in appreciative terms, supported in brief addresses by Rev. Dr. Morrison, J. E. B. McCready, and J. J. Johnston and passed by a unanimous standing vote. The chairman in tendering to the eloquent and erudite lecturer this marked tribute expressed the hope that they might again have an opportunity at no distant day of listening to Dr. Quigley.
