

MALTECHMENT OF NEGRO SAILORS

RIGA, Russia, Nov. 24 (Special)—Serious maltreatment of negro sailors by the master and Finnish crew has, it is stated, been discovered on board a Finnish sailing vessel which has arrived here from Africa with a cargo of redwood.
