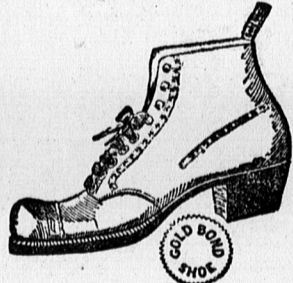

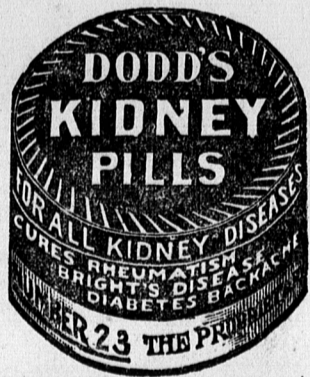

#### EXPECTS ITALY TO FIGHT.

LONDON, November 3.—According to Henry Evans, an American who arrived today from Italy, the feeling in that country is overwhelmingly for the Allies. When he left there a few days ago it was then felt that Turkey would enter the conflict, and many Italians, he said, expressed the opinion that Italy soon would join the Allies.

"The Italian army," he said, "is in fine shape, and so is the navy. The Italians believe their navy could soon make the position of the Allies in the Mediterranean secure beyond a question, while the army could deliver a mortal blow to Austria. There is not a shortage of coal in Italy now, although there appeared to be some time ago. From what I could learn, Italy was preventing foodstuffs from going to Germany. Many of the Italian papers bitterly assail the Germans, while Italians themselves say there would be a revolt if they had to fight for the Austrians."

#### ROYAL REBUKE FOR BIG LONDON STORE.

LONDON, Nov. 4.—One of London's great department stores has removed from its window its royal patronage signs. This is said to be due to a royal rebuke.

This store, where Queen Alexandra has heretofore done her shopping, sent a check for ten thousand pounds to the Prince of Wales last year to the credit of its advertising account, in view of the publicity given it.

However, the managers of the Prince of Wales Fund discovered that the store dismissed half of its staff, so that the donation came really not from the firm, but from its unfortunate discharged employees. Whereupon the check was sent back, and the royal patronage taken from the firm.

The problem in England is to avoid pauperising the unemployed. The burden placed on private charity is as all that can stand. Both in the case of the Prince of Wales and of Queen Mary's Funds, the principle is to provide employment, rather than to make doles to the idle. While some industries have received an artificial stimulus through the war, others have been forced to close. It is the aim of the royal family to induce employers to keep their business going, even at a loss, rather than to discharge hands and soothe their consciences by giving to charities which their own actions have made necessary.

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 5.—There will be increased acreage next year of twenty per cent., according to the majority of the Winnipeg grain men approached on the subject. Some say twenty-five per cent, and others think twenty is a little high, but all agree that from 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 acres

will be put under crop next year more than this year. This means 13,000,000 acres sown to wheat. The 11,000,000 acres this year have produced a crop of 150,000,000 bushels. A normal yield for that acreage would be 200,000,000. Next year, with average conditions, we should reap 250,000,000 bushels of wheat.

"I think the increase in acreage will run from twenty to twenty-five per cent.," says S. T. Smith, President of the Grain Exchange. "Farmers are ploughing every bit of land they can get hands on. They are letting summer fallow go neglected for the first time. Altogether, I should not be surprised to see a twenty-five per cent. increase for our next crop. That means a lot when you remember that the land under wheat this year was over 11,000,000 acres."

#### DATES FOR WINTER MEETING AT OTTAWA.

OTTAWA, Nov. 5.—Dates for the midwinter race meeting on the Ottawa officers of the Hull Driving Club. It will open on Thursday, January 28th, and conclude on Wednesday, February 3rd. There will be three races each day, and a total prize offering of \$12,000.

The track will be built on the river about 300 yards east of the Inter-Provincial Bridge, and the book-making buildings will be situated on the Quebec side of the stream. It will be a half-mile track, and the dates will not conflict in any way with those of the Montreal or Toronto meetings. It was feared that the conditions prevalent in Canada due to the European war would result in the exclu-

sion of American entries this winter, but assurance has been received from the Canadian Government that none of the horses will be commandeered.

## Notice Regarding Dressing Hogs

As a result of Government Inspection it is absolutely necessary that more attention be given to dressing hogs for market in order to avoid refusal by Inspectors.

They insist that the head, ears and feet should be thoroughly cleaned, every hair removed, the carcass carefully washed and kept perfectly clean when handling.

Some few farmers are not splitting the hogs between the hams and are leaving the bung gut—and in some cases even the manure—in. This must be remedied also, and in future a reduction of 2 lbs. per hog will be made on all hogs reaching here dressed in this manner, as to say the least it does not look well. Hogs must be split down completely, and bung gut and refuse removed.
