MUTE CONGREGATION TO HAVE CHURCH IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, July 29.—Chicago's silent church congregation, composed of many of the 2,000 deaf of the city, will have a permanent church home when the new City Temple is dedicated...

The members of the deaf mission have been without a place of meeting of their own since the old First Church, on the site of the new edifice, was pulled down.

"But the deaf congregation still holds its services once a week," says Constable E. Hasonstab, assistant pastor. "Every Sunday afternoon they come together from all parts of the city for their worship service of Scripture readings, sermon and hymns in the sign language."

There is an illustrated stereopticon lecture, and by watching the signs of the interpreter they enjoy programs of readings, plays and songs. We also have study courses with 35 members of the deaf congregation enrolled.

Twice every month the negro deaf meet at Hartzell Center with a somewhat similar program to that given for the other members of the church.

Chicago's work for the deaf began in 1859. The permanent church was organized in 1922. The Rev. Mr. Hasonstab came here from the state school for the deaf at Jacksonville to organize a congregation. Recently the work has grown to include three state schools for the deaf in 50 cities.

JOHNSON MAY TRY FOR PRESIDENCY

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Prominent Republican politicians, who are narrowly watching Senator Hiram Johnson, have concluded he is studying the reaction of his recent New York speech and if he believes it favorable he will become a candidate against Mr. Harding.

Senator Johnson will make other speeches through the country to get his views before the public and ascertain whether he stands any show of nomination.

At one time he had decided not to run, but this week he has been strongly urged to do so, and has been told by some of his admirers that he can defeat Harding in the primaries. He is showing pronounced symptoms of being willing to listen.

Montreal Judge Takes Circumstances Into Consideration

MONTREAL, July 29.—Chief Justice Decarie does not think that women alone are the possessors of serpent tongues, but in all owing to one Pierre MacDuff, an executor to go free he showed that there was extenuating circumstances when a man strikes a woman for trying to make trouble between married couples.

The counsel for the soldier had explained that "if Justice would put a penalty on the serpent tongues of women there would be fewer divorces." MacDuff, his wife and Marie Louise Roy, the complainant, were all employed in a tobacco factory when the trouble occurred. The girl had gone to Mrs. MacDuff and had told her that her husband had been giving chocolates and carrying cushions

for another girl in the factory. Mrs. MacDuff broke into tears. Her husband arrived on the scene. The girl followed, although witnesses swore that the girl had avoided most of his force. The wife in court declared that she had never doubted MacDuff before this girl's tale had reached her ears, being quite happy with him. She looked happy when she left the court with her husband.

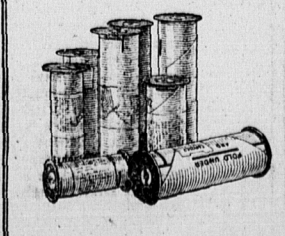
