The French War Debt

(Special to The Guardian.) — LONDON, Aug. 27.—The conference on the French war debt to Great Britain between the French Finance Minister, M. Caillaux, and the British Chancellor of the Exchequer, Winston Churchill, suddenly took a dramatic turn today after a deadlock which made agreement seem impossible. The British, after a Cabinet meeting hastily summoned, unexpectedly said they would accept from France an annual payment in settlement of the debt of \$12,500,000 in sixty-two annual instalments to be provided by France entirely from French resources and without drawing at all upon French receipts from Germany through the Dawes plan.

(Canadian Press) — TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 29.—In the recent appointment of Miss Eileen O'Brien to the staff of the Canadian Social Hygiene Council, she is organizing secretary of the newly formed branch at Montreal. Her work along these lines for the past seven years has been carried on in Great Britain, Czechoslovakia, France, Servia, Hungary, Poland and the U. S.

Miss O'Brien was educated at Bedford College for Women. After passing in London University as a sanitary inspector she was sent on active service as a sanitary inspector to Serbia. In that country she was active in a general clean-up campaign. Last year Miss O'Brien came to America to study public health methods, choosing as best centers for this purpose New York, Philadelphia and Toronto.

ed us to come here and you told us these advantages were waiting for us." And so an appeal to national sentiment to these people finds no response. Canadian nationality does not amount to any more with them than American nationality.

Useless to Grouch

It is useless the speaker yelled, to cry out about Maritime rights and grievances. We must put our requirements into definite terms; our need of getting our products into the markets of the central provinces; the necessity of lower freight rates and the building up of Maritime ports. Here we have a strong argument in our favor. If it is a national work to build up factories in Quebec and Ontario, why is it not a provincial work to build up our ports in these provinces by the sea?

Presenting the case of the Maritime Provinces

Presenting the case of the Maritime Provinces to various Boards of Trade and individuals whom he met throughout his trip. Mr. Belding did not attack and blame for our conditions; he simply stated the facts. The Fathers of Confederation could not have foreseen all that has transpired since their time, but the fact remains that the West Indians cannot go on under present conditions.

He was asked, "Well, what is your remedy?"

He suggested more assistance "as regards our fisheries; the appointment of a trade agent for the West Indies; help in marketing our products; better transportation facilities; an opportunity to develop our local industries—not to compete with the central provinces but to get them into the markets of the West Indies; and a gentleman in Montreal, "What would you regard as a reasonable subsidy to enable you to do this?" This was a question Mr. Belding could not answer; but it showed the interest which is already being taken in our point of view.

The speaker returned home determined to get a definite answer to the question of the West Indian provinces had asked: "Just what do you want us to do to help you on the road to prosperity?"

With this end in view the conference at Moncton was called, which was attended by Mr. W. L. Higgins, president of the Maritime Board of Trade; and it was decided to call a meeting of the Maritime Board for the discussion of (1) Transportation facilities; (2) Immigration; (3) Industrial development and (4) the status of the Maritime Provinces under the Confederation pact. It was decided to appoint three committees, one from each of the provinces. Later it was thought best to refer the matter of transportation to an expert whose assistance the provincial governments have kindly agreed to meet, and who will represent the Maritimes at the hearings before the Board of Railway Commissioners. The three committees will convene within a few days and a joint report will be prepared and submitted at a meeting in Charlottetown sometime next month. That will be the case for the Maritime Provinces as it will be presented before a National Conference shortly to be called at Edmonton.

apostle to the Gentiles. And so the great business of the ministry to-day must continue to be, the preaching of the truth as it is in Jesus, as the means of extending throughout all the world. It was when preaching was side tracked and the church exalted rites and ceremonies to the prominent place, and the Christian clergyman became a mere sacerdotal machine, that darkness covered the land and gross darkness the people. But with the coming in of the glorious Reformation period, as well as that of the Puritan and Covenanting movements, the preaching of the cross was restored to the place it had occupied in the early history of the Christian church. The tendency at present was to undervalue the great ordinance of preaching. It was asserted by many that other means must now be used to draw people to religion; if not to make them religious; in other words that entertainment should take the place of instruction. Christ did not establish his church for the purpose of furnishing entertainment, but for the purpose of edification and beckoning men to be reconciled to God. Sensationalism in the pulpit was another prevalent evil which was not only dishonoring to God's sanctuary, but positively injurious to the souls of men. It is sadly true in many cases that "a hungry sheep look up and are not fed."

3. The Lord Jesus is the preacher of the Word.

Whatever other agencies may assist in pushing forward the enterprises of the church, conversions cannot possibly be secured, nor the work of God's Zion made permanent; if Christ and Him crucified is not held up as the preacher's great theme, and the sinner's perfect plea. "For we preach not ourselves, but Christ Jesus the Lord, and ourselves your servants for Jesus' sake." It has ever pleased God, by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe. He will continue to own and bless these means if the ministry are only true to their sacred trust. Let them hold aloft the banner of Calvary's Cross. As a church and people, we are surely compassed about with a great cloud of witnesses, confessors, and martyrs for Christ's crown and covenant, saying to us like that message of our soldier dead in Flanders' fields—

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Aug. 27.—There was a fairly busy day in the English importers on the Montreal market today for Manitoba spring wheat for prompt and nearby shipment, but on account of the continued light offerings little business of importance was done. The market was quiet when the new crop wheat and sales of old loads of No. 1 Northern wheat were made to London for September shipment, and old lots of old crop, 2 Northern enroute from Port William were sold to New York at 32 cents per bushel, 22 cents per bushel over the Winnipeg October option C.I.F. Montreal, and some No. 2 Canadian West oats were worked at 17 cents per bushel over, C.I.F. A little more business was transacted in cash grain on the domestic market, there being a steady demand for American malting barley for export account and sales were made 78 1/2 cents per bushel S.E.F. while Ontario No. 3 malting barley in car lots sold for local account at 35 cents per bushel, and another lot of Ontario No. 3 malting barley sold for 34 cents per bushel, and sales of quite a few loads were made at 50 to 53 cents per bushel, extra track as to quality.

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Making Estimates On Wheat Pool

WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 29.—Estimates as to the amount of the final payment to be made by the Wheat Pool on account of the 1924 crop are varied but tend to centre around an additional ten cents per bushel on No. 1. All estimates are of course purely speculative since the officials of the Pool show a great aptitude for keeping the business of the Pool to themselves, I, however an additional ten cents should happen to be a correct estimate it will bring the price obtained by the Pool up to \$1.65, and will represent the estimated economic value of 1924 wheat as apart from fluctuating exchange and market values.

White undoubtedly here and there it is possible to find members of the Wheat Pool who, remembering that 1924 wheat was quoted at over two dollars on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange, will not be satisfied with the price secured by the Pool. It is also true that the majority of pool members are well satisfied with the result to date. It is the consensus of opinion throughout the three prairie provinces that whatever other benefits the Wheat Pool may have for its members its greatest benefit has been the system of interim payments. By this system the farmer has had his returns from his wheat crop spread out over the crop year and in the case of the payment received in the fall when the market is at its lowest, the farmer has had in cases that he has cash on hand with which to purchase his twine and other requisites for this year's harvest.
