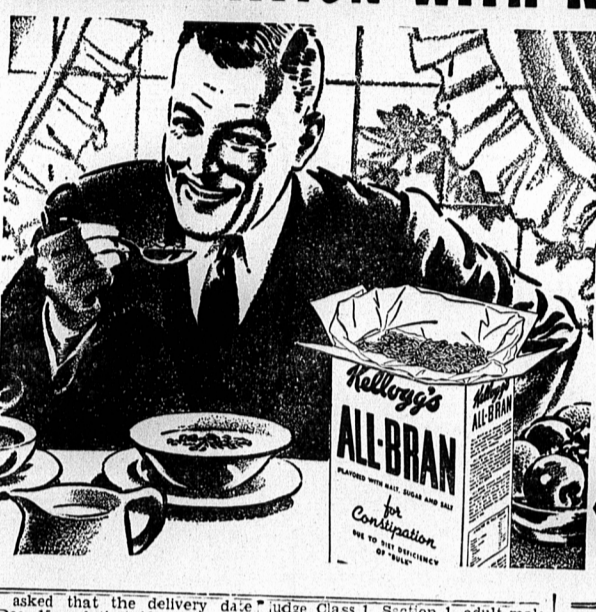

had resolved that its aid must reach the fighting lines, he added in a reference to amendment of the American Neutrality Act, "we shall be able to strike with all our might and main."

In the wake of all these gathering forces, the Prime Minister declared that "what is called a peace offensive from Berlin" could be expected shortly, but this he disposed of in advance with a cold remark: "wherever surpassed in his speech."

"The guilty men who have let loose upon the world are hoping to escape by their fleeting triumphs and ill-gotten plunder from the closing net of doom."

"We owe it to ourselves, we owe it to our Russian allies, and to the government and people of the United States to make it absolutely clear that whether we are supported or alone, however long and hard the fight may be, the British nation and His Majesty's government will stand head to head with the governments of the great dominions, will never enter into any negotiations with Hitler or with any party in Germany which represents the Nazi regime."

For Nazi mass executions in the occupied lands, Mr. Churchill denounced Hitler as "the arch-criminal... the Nazi ogre, who even himself was now frightened by the world's indignation."

"A river of blood has flowed and is flowing between the German race and the peoples of all Europe," the Prime Minister declared, "and it is not the hot blood of battle, where good blows are given and returned. It is the cold blood of the execution yard and scaffold which leaves a stain indelible for centuries."

"Here, then, are the foundations upon which the new order of Europe is to be inaugurated. Here, in the future, is the warming festival of the herrenvolk."

In no more effective manner could they have frustrated the accomplishment of their own designs. The future of Europe is in the hands of the British people and the British government, and it is the duty of every citizen to do his part for the future of Europe to be freed.

ing for intense concentration by the three well qualified foxmen who are conducting it. They must be prepared almost instantly to destroy a fox to a color class ranging from Class 1 medium silver all through the various color phases of silvers as well as the new types of marked silvers, standard platinum silvers, standard platinum and standard silver pearl blues. The variations in color phases are sometimes very difficult to adjust but usually a fox falls into his right category and if there is a "slip-up" it is noted by the classifiers and an adjustment made later.

### Kept Busy

Secretary W. R. Shaw and staff are "kept busy" on their feet as a card must be issued to each fox, classified and this must check with entry slip and tattoo marks.

### Many Attend

Although it was only classifying day, there were many visitors yesterday. Most of them interested in the new types they had heard and read so much about. Cameras were flashed and a really good snap taken of a Le Forest platinum pup owned by Stewart and Lewis, Summerside and held by two young ladies. This pup had been sold a few weeks ago for \$1,000 but was not to be delivered until after this exhibition.

### Grand Display

The entry list, larger than last year is also of better quality due perhaps to the very favorable season and heavier methods of feeding now in vogue. Practically all the foxes were larger—certainly the pups, than other years. The crossing of the white faces and ring-necks with good quality full silver females has produced some beautiful animals. Then there is a generous display of the new type platinum silvers.

### Silvers Not Neglected

The display of silvers is fully up to other years and the number on exhibition will run close to last year's total. Some of the pups are very large and scarcely distinguishable from heavy furred adults. Color is generally good as most of the exhibitors are using wire-bottom pens.

### Publicity in Three displays

Three Prince Edward Island Advertising Displays being shown in New York City this week, one at Regina, Sask., and one at MacLeod, Alberta.

Island attractions will receive quite a lot of good publicity this week through three separate displays arranged by the local Travel Bureau Office. The first of these is at a large bazaar being conducted by the Canadian Women's Club of New York. A separate booth has been allotted to Prince Edward Island and in this a number of large colored framed pictures of Island scenes will be shown, which went forward from here last week. The booth will be decorated with ribbons of garnet, blue, and gold.

Another display will be at the National Hotel Exposition at Grand Central Palace and quite a large amount of literature has gone forward together with other material for use there. The display will be in the section of the Canadian Government Exhibition. This display runs from the 10th to the 14th.

The third one is at the Immense Victory Ball being held on the 14th by the British Great War Veterans of America at which it is expected over four thousand people will be in attendance. It was quite interesting to find out that Mr. B. Graham Rogers, Supervisor of the local Travel Bureau has been working very closely with this organization for some time past and in a letter received last night from the Secretary he indicated that a number of the members who have care are already thinking of coming here next summer for their holidays. A lot of Prince Edward Island literature has already been distributed through their members including the now famous Prince Edward Island car stickers. They have asked for two thousand more of these stickers for distribution the night of the big Ball.

At Regina, Saskatchewan, this week the annual banquet of The Maritime Provinces Association is being held. One of the large Prince Edward Island booklets will be placed at the dinner table for each guest. A large colored framed picture of the Island scene will be placed on the table. The President, MacLeod, is the site of the first white settlement in Alberta. There are no maple trees in that part of the province and among other things a large box of overly red maple leaves which will be used to decorate the head table as a souvenir from the Island. The booklets will be distributed to each guest.

RED CROSS PRISONERS OF WAR PARCELS

A report has just been received at Provincial Headquarters from National Red Cross Headquarters of the number of parcels of War which have been received in Toronto during the four days October 27th-31st. This shows that no less than 11,344 cards arrived from 35 different prison camps the most of which are in Germany but they have also come from France, Belgium and Italy. To date 53,612 parcels of Prisoners of War have been received from a total of 91 camps. 25,000 parcels for Prisoners of War are now being packed in Canada—each week and they certainly are a God-send to the recipients.

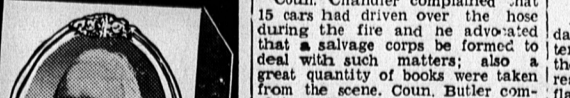
