**HEARTY RECEPTION TENDERED TO SERGT. NORMAN W. LOWTHER. A GIFT IN GOLD AND AN ADDRESS PRESENTED TO HIM.**

Lowther, Kennington, who before the outbreak of war taught for two years in Centerville School, and was a general favorite with old and young. At this juncture Miss Laura Hammill, teacher, came forward and read an address and Miss Maud Wright presented Sergt. Lowther, with \$20.00 in gold on behalf of the repayments of the school as a slight token of esteem and appreciation. Sergt. Lowther made a suitable reply, thanking the people for their kindness to him both at this time and while he was in the trenches.

Violin Selection by Mr. Louis Pearson.  
Duet, "The Boys of the 105th" by two very small boys in Khaki, Master Atkinson Wright and Master Russell Noonan was received with great applause and they were forced to respond to an encore.  
Sergt. Lowther then gave a talk on life in the trenches, relating some of his experiences in France and Belgium, and telling some amusing anecdotes.  
He was followed by a chorus by the audience, Miss Louise Schurman presiding.  
Cornet duet, "Home Sweet Home," by Messrs. T. Gallant and Andrew Noonan.  
Address by Rev. Geo. Ayers.  
The next number was a contest, "A Musical Romance" in which all participated. The first prize was won by Mr. Lewis Treaman, St. John's, and the consolation prize by Mr. John Prizick.  
Violin selections were given by Messrs Louis Pearson and Andrew Noonan. The chairman then proposed three cheers for Sergt. Lowther, which were given with will and the band struck up "For he's a jolly good fellow." The National Anthem brought to a close a most enjoyable evening.

**EVACUATING RHEIMS**

**SALVATIONISTS LEAVE MIDST SHELL-SHOWER**

Latest news from Rheims is to the effect that our brave comrade, Adjutant Carrel, with four thousand of the endangered inhabitants, has been removed to Paris. As our readers will know, the Adjutant has stuck to her post in the stricken city, saving bodies and souls until now. Though many remarkable escapes have been chronicled, it was not until the last days that the first Salvationist was killed there.

On April 4th two shells fell on the house of this comrade, whose husband had already perished earlier in the bombardment, and she lost her life. About this time, also, the Salvation Army Hall was demolished, though fortunately the people who had been accustomed to shelter there had gone to a great wine cellar, "thirty steps down." Seventy-nine were counted here.

When, at last, the order came to leave, which time poison-gas, incendiary shell, and high explosives had caused many fatalities, our comrades had to rush through a veritable shower of missiles on their way to safety.
