LETTERS PATENT GRANTED.—The Lieut. Governor-in-Council, it was announced in Saturday's Royal Gazette has granted letters patent for the incorporation of the "Economy Fox Farming Co., Ltd." with a capital stock of \$100,000, divided into ten-dollar shares; and the "J. E. Milligan Fox Co., Ltd." with a capital stock of \$275,000, divided into 275,000 dollar shares.

SHIPPING.—A Pictou exchange says that there have been an unusual number of schooners in port for coal lately. We counted 20 schooners loaded of one day and there must have been forty altogether in port. The Acadia Coal Company have been shipping more coal than usual by schooner this fall and the Drummond have the contract for the P. E. I. railroad, which takes a number of schooners to handle.

A NEW COMPANY.—"The Canada Auto-Pneumatic Pump and Machinery Co., Ltd." is the title of an organization that is being formed in this province and is now seeking incorporation by letters patent. Among the objects for which incorporation are sought are to purchase, own, hold, lease, acquire, mortgage and sell or otherwise dispose of lands and real estate in this province; to construct, erect, manufacture, import, export and sell pneumatic pumps of every nature and kind; to construct and manufacture, import and export and sell implements and machinery of every kind; to erect and construct wells and carry on a general manufacturing business in lumber, brick, cement, grain, leather, iron and all articles capable of being manufactured therefrom, or incidental thereto, or connected therewith and to sell the products of the same; to carry on a general plumbing business; to contract for the erection of all kinds of private and public buildings, wharves, bridges and other works and to do all things incidental thereto.
