### THE ARMY OF THE UNEMPLOYED.

The present is an era of industrial depression with many workers out of employ and many strikes arising from opposite causes to those that prevailed in recent years. In time of expansion the strikes were mainly for increased pay. Now under stress of depression, the railways, the mine-owners and the great industries of the United States and Canada are reducing the wages of those whom they retain in service. It is against reduction in wages that the strikes are now aimed.

A great change has come over the industrial world within a year. Railways in the United States and Canada were unable to have engines and cars built fast enough to supply their needs. Now there are hundreds of thousands of idle cars. It is much the same in many industries. On all sides production is being curtailed and the thousands of the unemployed are multiplying throughout North America. Strikes for more pay were frequently successful in past years of great expansion. But the great law of supply and demand must prevail in the end. Today the labor market is overstocked, wages are being reduced and strikes against reduction must in most cases prove unsuccessful.

Today the number of the unemployed in Montreal, Toronto and other Canadian cities is becoming a matter of grave concern and immigrants are coming by thousands, many of them with very little money in their pockets and unused to the stern duties and new modes of life which the settler must encounter. Many of these are now hanging on about the cities and swelling the ranks of the great army of those who are, out of work. It is a time when no immigrants should come to Canada except those prepared to become actual settlers and who are adapted for that work and equipped with money enough to maintain themselves till the soil can yield them a living.

### PRIZES FOR BEST GRAIN FIELDS

The value of the work of the Provincial Department of Agriculture to the farmers of Prince Edward Island in the promotion of pure seeds cannot be overestimated as may be seen in part by reference to the letter from George H. Clark, Seed Commissioner, Ottawa, which is printed in another column. A great interest in this matter has been aroused by means of the seed grain judging classes, good seed meetings, seed fairs and competition for prizes in seed grain at the annual exhibitions. To further encourage the production of high class seed grain as a means of improving the farm crops, the Commissioner of Agriculture has now inaugurated a Field Competition in oats and wheat production. The grain is to be judged in different stages of growth and before being cut. Cash prizes amounting in all to \$216, to be divided equally between the three counties, will be awarded in each county as follows:

The main objects of the competition are:—  
1. To stimulate a greater interest in the growing of first-class seed grain.  
2. To encourage the practice of

growing seed for next year's crop separate from the main crop, using only the best obtainable seed, sowing it on the cleanest and best prepared land, allowing it to thoroughly ripen, and threshing and storing it separately.

3. To obtain pure grain, that is free from other varieties, the presence of which can best be detected by the grain is growing.

4. To encourage the use of seed from heavy yielding strains.

5. To promote the sowing of seed from clean, vigorous crops of uniform stand and of bright straw, in the case of the smaller cereals.

6. To encourage careful and intelligent farming and the production of grain free from weed seeds.

There have been several unpleasant revelations in connection with the administration of public affairs in New Brunswick since the change of Government there. The first of these was the confessed default and suicide of the late Deputy Surveyor General. Since then it has transpired that a prominent member of the late Government had chequed out of the provincial suspense account something over \$4,000, which sum was repaid to the treasury five days after the election. The best that can be said is that in neither of the two cases referred to was there any considerable loss to the Province, the Deputy Surveyor General being under bonds which will make good his default. But a shockingly loose method of dealing with public moneys has been revealed which arouses concern lest other revelations may be yet in store.

Hon. F. L. Haszard has resigned the position of City Recorder, which he has filled for years with credit and rumor has it, we know not on what authority, that he may presently retire from the law agency of the Department of Justice. Such action, should he decide to take it, would meet with very general approbation. There is a feeling that the leader of the Government ought to be free from all entanglements or emoluments that might possibly detract from or divide his services to the Province. The prompt appointment of Stipendiary Magistrate McDonald to the vacant Recordership will meet with general approval. The two offices were formerly united in one person, so that the old order of things in that regard is restored. Mr. McDonald is well qualified in every way for the position, is thoroughly conversant with civic affairs and is personally popular with the Councilors and in the City generally.
