E. Island for the winter. This year he returned to Moncton and obtained from H. H. Warman \$39.75 to bring the horse over to this province and return he gave Mr. Warman a bill of sale of the horse, claiming it as his own. Later, it is further stated, Rockford in conversation with Geo. V. Steeves, barber, of this city, asked him if he wanted to buy a good horse which was at that time in a barn on Robinson street. He also told Mr. Steeves that he had a bill against the horse for \$4, and that he wished to sell it, naming the price as \$60 above the bill of sale. Mr. Steeves, after looking the horse over, paid over the \$60, and also made an agreement with Mr. Warman whereby he would return the three months' promissory note due the latter. About three weeks ago the horse had been in possession of Mr. Steeves, Mr. Fowler, came to Moncton, and after informing Mr. Steeves that the horse was his property, he, with the chief of police, went to the barn and took the horse away, putting it to Sussex. Steeves immediately afterwards reported the matter to the police, and forthwith a warrant was sworn out for Samuel A. Rockford's arrest. Yesterday afternoon Chief Sullivan placed Rockford under arrest. He was brought to Moncton, Rockford still claims that he is the rightful owner of the horse, and Chief Rideout has notified Mr. Fowler to this effect, requesting that he be present in the Moncton Police Court on Monday next in order that the case might be settled.—Moncton Exe.
