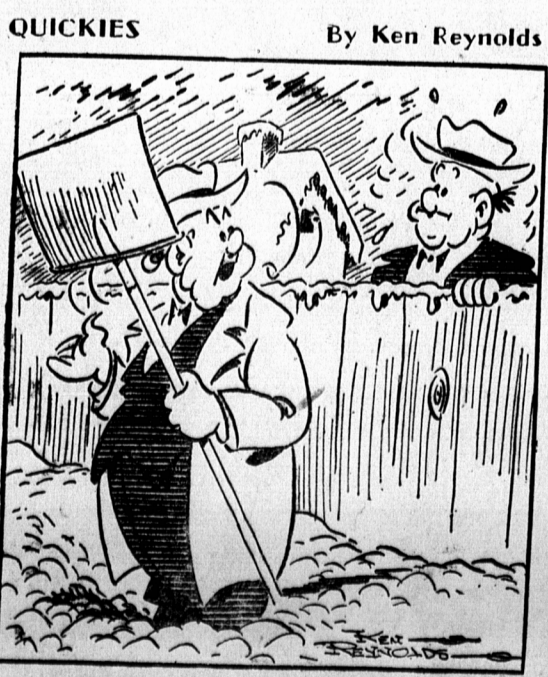

**FUNERAL AT ORWELL** — The funeral of the late Mr. Roderick MacLean, Orwell, was held from the home of his daughter, Mrs. Nell MacLeod, Tuesday, March 11th at 2 p.m. at Orwell United Church and was largely attended. **THE HOSPITAL SHORTAGE** — The regular supper meeting of the Y's Men's Club was held Thursday in the Victorian Room of the Queen Hotel. Dr. J. A. MacMillan was speaker for the occasion, and gave an interesting outline of some problems in medical economics that affect all as taxpayers. Speaking of the shortage of nurses in Canada, Dr. MacMillan said that Prince Edward Island was as well off as any province in that respect. There are some hospitals that cannot open because of lack of nursing staff. Although nurses' salaries are up 66 per cent the last few years, the salary question, particularly with respect to the training period, is the main reason why more nurses are not entering the profession. In the United States, he said, the C. I. O. is attempting to organize hospital employees into unions. This was done at the Toronto General Hospital with increases in wage rates resulting, that upper consideration of the cost of that hospital's services.

Canada needs, about four thousand more doctors, Dr. MacMillan stated, and the present rate of graduation is not enough to take care of doctors retiring or dying. One reason for this shortage is the long period of study and internship and the high cost of obtaining the education. At twelve to fifteen hundred a year while studying, plus loss of earning power as a student and intern, the cost of a doctor's education is several thousand dollars. For brain specialist who intern for about ten years, the cost of his education is estimated at \$25,000.

The hospital shortage was dealt with next, and Dr. MacMillan said that there should be 75 beds per 1000 of population, which in Prince Edward Island would be 750, or a shortage of 500 beds at the present time. Lack of room at home to take care of sick, the discovery of new drugs that require special treatment, more money in circulation, and to a lesser extent, hospital insurance have created new demands for hospital space. At the same time, hospital costs per patient per day have risen rapidly, and on the Island are now over \$4.00. The care of indigent patients is a special problem here, where the Government contributes about 22c per patient day against actual cost to the hospital at 65c. The balance is made up in the higher rate the paying patient pays.

Mental hospitals require more beds in Canada than General hospitals, and there is a greater shortage of this type of service. Mental hospitalization costs the Government far more than it spends on all other branches of health, and yet the services are not up to minimum standards.

In conclusion Dr. MacMillan stated that all of these shortages when overcome would be paid for out of taxpayer's money, and it was up to them to see that they got the best value for each dollar spent on health. Voluntary hospital insurance seemed about the cheapest way to him. Insurance schemes operated by Governments always seemed to cost more than the other types.

**LEGION EXECUTIVE MEETING** — The Executive of the Provincial Command of the Canadian Legion held a meeting Thursday night at the home of the Charlottetown Branch. Called at the request of Major Jack Wright, Island representative on the Legion National Committee for canteen funds, the matter of administration and disposal of such funds was discussed and recommendations made. The Provincial Chairman, Lieut.-Col. J. D. Stewart presided. Reports were heard from the three county representatives on the Command, Major J.A. Macdonald, King's; Harry Bishop, Prince; Lieut.-Col. Stewart, Queen's. Representatives of the Mount Stewart Branch of the Legion reported that plans were going ahead for rebuilding following the recent disastrous fire. Murray River Branch presented a resolution concerning a request to have a detachment of the R.C.M.P. resident in that vicinity. The Provincial President, Mr. James S. Walker was present.
