Island Draws Bye For This Year's Ball Title

All Provinces Must Be Prepared For Playoffs On Sept. 10th.—Abegweits At Last Get Big Chance.

The attention of Sport Clubs is called to the following article which was passed at the annual meeting of the M. P. B. of the A. A. U. of C. held on October 3, 1930:

Article 13

Baseball—All Provinces must be ready for the Maritime Playdowns on the 10th of September—Semi-finals shall be the best two out of three, the team winning the toss shall have the choice to select where the first game shall be played and the third game if necessary shall be played on the same grounds as the second. Receipts of the third game shall be split 50-50 after ho-

tel expenses of the visiting team are deducted and the necessary game expenses. Finals shall consist of a 5 game series, the team winning the toss shall have the choice of grounds and the fifth game if necessary shall be played on neutral territory. In the event of team winning three straight games, fourth game must be played as an exhibition game and the receipts of the second and fourth be split 50-50 of the net. In the event of rain game shall be played on the following days. Byes shall be drawn as follows—1931 P. E. I.; 1932, N. S.; 1933, N. B.

ROVERS WIN OPENER 4-1

Striking out twelve batters in seven innings without giving a free ride over the route and only allowing three hits to be beaten 4 to 1, was the tough break handed "Lefty" McQuaid, Eastern Star port-sider in their opening City League game with the Rovers last evening.

Only a fair attendance witnessed the tilt, which was featureless, with the exception of one or two brilliant plays, especially Donovan's shoe string catch of McDonald's short left field drive in the third inning.

The Rovers, although batting against McQuaid's airtight pitching, played crafty ball by turning almost every Star error into runs. Carbonell, hurling for the Rovers, was hit often but not safely, the opposing batsmen only counting for five safe blows. "Carby" is pitching better early ball this year, and if appearances count for anything he looks good for an excellent season.

Game By Innings

First Inning—Stars. K. Acorn at bat. Is thrown out by Carbonell. McDonald flies out to Blanchard at first. McCabe singles to short right field. Bolger grounds out. 1 hit; no runs; no errors.

Rovers—Murley singles to deep centre, and steals second. McInnis next batter takes two and one, while Murley plfers third. McInnis strikes out. Whitlock strikes. Francis knocks an easy ground ball to Goss, who fumbles the chance, Murley scoring and Francis going down safe. With McQuaid hurling good ball, it was a tough break. Francis lands on third on wild throws, but dies there when McQuaid strikes Carson out. 1 run, 1 hit, 1 error.

Second Inning

Stars—McQuaid works Carbonell for a free ride. Kerr batting, Carbonell balks, McQuaid takes second. Kerr hits into double play, catching McQuaid off second. Goss singles to deep centre. Dodds up. Goss caught at second on a perfect throw by Francis. No runs, 1 hit, no errors.

Rovers—Donovan strikes out. Williams gets down on a short infield ground ball. McQuaid's error. Blanchard strikes out. Carbonell at bat. Williams is caught steal-

ing home. No hits, no runs, 1 error.

Third Inning

Stars—Dodds grounds out to McInnis to Blanchard. Doyle strikes out. Acorn grounds to McInnis but is safe on the throw. McDonald flies to short left to give Donovan a chance makes a great out. No hits, no runs, no errors.

Rovers—Carbonell gets two bags on another error by Goss who throws wild on a ground ball. Murley strikes out. McInnis flies out to Kerr at third. Whitlock beats out an infield hit. Francis doubles to left field, scoring Carbonell and Whitlock. Whalen at bat. Francis steals third. Whalen knocks down a fast ground ball which is nicely fielded by Goss, who throws him out. 2 runs, 1 hit, 1 error.

Fourth Inning

Stars—McCabe flies out to Murley in centre. Bolger grounds out to McInnis. McQuaid drives a fast one through Whalen at third. Kerr strikes out. No hits, no runs, 1 error.

Rovers—Donovan out on a weak grounder to McQuaid. Williams strikes out. Blanchard strikes out. No hits, no runs, no errors.

Fifth Inning

Stars—Goss gets a pass. Dodds sacrifices Goss to third. Doyle doubles to centre scoring Goss. Acorn doubles to left field, but Doyle is caught trying to make home. McDonald flies out to Murley at centre.

Rovers—Carbonell strikes out. Murley strikes out. McInnis grounds out to McQuaid. No hits, no runs, no errors.

Sixth Inning

Stars—McCabe is hit by Carbonell and gets a pass. Bolger up. McCabe steals second. Bolger gets a pass as Carbonell appears to weaken. McQuaid grounds to McInnis who fumbles the chance and fills the bases. Kerr flies out to Whalen. Goss strikes out. Dodds strikes out. Carbonell hurled himself out of a tight hole. No hits, no runs, no errors.

Rovers—Whitlock strikes out. Francis grounds out to Acorn to Kerr. Whalen knocks out a two bagger and stretches it into a home run when the ball is lost in the bushes. Donovan strikes out. 1 hit, 1 run, no errors.

Seventh Inning

Stars—Doyle strikes out. Acorn beats out a nice infield hit. McDonald grounds out to Carbonell. McCabe grounds out to Carbonell.
