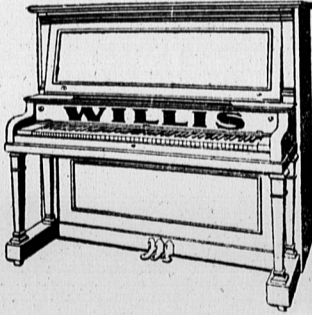
NEW YORK MILLIONAIRE TRAMP RETIRES

Edward A. Brown Will Tramp No More; He Knows Now How The Other Half Live, and Will Try to Help Them.

NEW YORK, May 9.—Edwin A. Brown, "the millionaire tramp," cousin of W. C. Brown, president of the New York Central, announced on his arrival here that he would never wear overalls again. He is through seeing, as a part of the show, the seamy side of life, he says, and now, with the rich experiences he has had in learning how the other half lives, he intends to carry on his work of impressing upon cities the necessity of providing municipal lodging houses, such as this city has, by other means than "living the dog's life" himself. He has no intention whatever, he says, of slackening his endeavors, but he has now seen the inside of prison walls in every section of the country, always on the sole charge of not having enough money to buy a bed and sees no reason why he should suffer the "down-and-out" man's privation further. Mr. Brown is a resident of Denver, where he is one of the city's largest real estate holders. With no

thirst for greater wealth than he has, he has for years been trying to learn by actual experience the sufferings of men who are honest and willing to work, and of others who are shiftless and almost worthless, as a result, possibly, he thinks, of the government's neglect. Mr. Brown is known all over the country. His efforts as a "friend to the friendless" have been praised by President Taft, and one of the Denver man's treasured possessions is a letter from the president, inquiring about his experience in helping homeless men of large cities. Mr. Brown has just completed a tour of the south. "I had hitherto visited as a homeless man, seeking work, and a temporary lodging, every section of the country except the south," said he in his room at the Waldorf last night, "and I felt that, though I had been through the horrors of the 'Bull Pen' of Denver, the jails at Pittsburg and other cities,

COUNTERFEIT COUNT IS SHREWD SWINDLER

ST. PETERSBURG, May 8.—Heinrich Wyler, son of a Swiss merchant in the Solothurn Canton, who has just been sentenced to four and a half years imprisonment for thefts, has been one of the most remarkable records for adroit swindling that has ever come before a Russian court. Variety has not been lacking, and the tale of his past life, as unfolded by the police, reads more like part of a sensational novel than real life. As a boy of seventeen, he was publicly whipped by his father for having insulted a young girl, and in a fit of rage and desperation left home. After some years of honest existence as a clerk in France he went to Monte Carlo, where he won \$3,000 with which he travelled through Italy and afterwards Spain, gaining considerable fluency in the language of both countries. Tired of this humdrum existence he then journeyed to Africa, where he made more money by trading in ivory and also—more remunerative department—in slaves. On his return voyage to Italy, with some \$10,000 capital, he met the Duke of the Abruzzi, who took an interest in the intelligent young man who could speak five languages, and he eventually appointed the duke's interpreter. Through the medium of the Duke, Wyler, was introduced to the famous Prof. Lombroso, who after knowing him a short time, declared that Wyler was not a fit person to be at large, as he had an intense criminal disposition. So furious was the duke on hearing the professor's statement that his behavior did actually lead to his being sent to a lunatic asylum in Milan but he escaped, with the result that his life from that time has borne out Lombroso's diagnosis with remarkable precision. A series of hotel thefts led to Wyler's flight to Bucharest, where a well-known theatrical beguety fell in love with him. He lived at her expense for a time, and then, tiring of her, made off with her jewels. Assuming the title of Count Havel, he next executed a series of remarkably daring robberies, the most sensational of which put him in possession of a magnificent diamond bracelet belonging to the wife of the Russian Ambassador at Rome. This was the cause of a recent affair. The lady was seated in her box at the Royal opera when an adjutant of the King of Italy entered and told her that the Queen, who was in the Royal box, opposite, had greatly admired her diamond bracelet, and would take it as a favor if she might be permitted to inspect it more closely. The lady entrusted the bracelet to the care of the supposed adjutant, who was Wyler in disguise, and he was not seen again in Rome. Since that the Russian police have been hunting everywhere for the thief. He appeared in Munich at the Marquis Rosetta and, becoming engaged to a Russian lady, whose acquaintance he made at a fashionable ball there, subsequently disappeared with jewelry valued at \$20,000. Then sink lower and lower as the result of much hard drinking. Wyler was eventually caught in the act of stealing an overcoat from a restaurant. It is stated that this extraordinary man has still a sum of about \$400,000 deposited in a Swiss bank the product of his life of swindling.

"Where shall we wash up and get breakfast?" I asked the old "Senator" after we had been put out. "Oh," he said, "we can get a cold washup in the city lavatory." He led the way, and we were soon in a nice, clean place, where they gave us a fresh, clean towel and soap, and didn't ask for any pay for it. I had never seen anything exactly like that in any city I had ever visited, and I asked the old "Senator" who had provided these things for the homeless man. "Tom Johnson," he said, and he added that Tom Johnson, who was then living, had done a number of things to help the wayfarer. In fact, I myself saw plenty of evidences of Johnson's work for the unfortunate. Cleveland is full of nice three-cent luncheon places, the outgrowth in a way of the three-cent fares advocated by Johnson.

"After the wash-up the old "Senator" suggested that we try the Charities' woodyard and though we had a supperless and sleepless night, we were told that if we split curly birch for an hour we could have breakfast. There was no help for it and weak as we were we had to do it. More than an hour at work we were called into a breakfast of something like oatmeal soup and a piece of hard bread and a black fluid which was mislabeled coffee. There was almost no nourishment in it. For the next night the old man made us sleep in the saloon again, found a bar and told me about it. We slept there, and I came near freezing to death. But I had seen enough to know that Cleveland was doing almost nothing for the homeless man."

When Mr. Brown was asked if he had any money to lend him, he replied that usually on these trips he did carry some money sewed in his clothing, but he added: "You see, it didn't matter; I am quite well known along Euclid avenue and could have turned in at almost any of the banks and got what I needed." Mr. Brown found conditions even worse in Cincinnati, while Louisville, Memphis, Mobile, Houston, and Dallas, the last city he visited, and most of the other southern cities are equally without facilities for sheltering the penniless stranger, no matter how filthy and how filthy they are. Directed to the Star of Hope Mission where he applied to a policeman for lodgings, and arrested when he reached the mission. He was released only when he revealed his identity to some newspaper men. His arrest, however, was due, he says, to a police blunder, and everywhere in the south he found the people deeply interested in a plan for helping the friendless man. It is Mr. Brown's purpose to sail for Europe in a few weeks to learn how Germany has provided for the homeless, but he'll do no tramping there.

AMHERST MAN'S MYSTERIOUS DEATH

AMHERST, May 10.—Rupert Noiles, a rather well-to-do farmer, from Fenwick, met his death under tragic circumstances, probably on Monday afternoon. He was last seen going to the Amherst Point marsh with a team of horses, it is supposed, after a load of hay on Monday afternoon. On Tuesday the horses were found wandering about the marsh, but Noiles was missing. A searching party was organized, and this afternoon the remains of Noiles were found on the seaward side of the dyke. How he came to his death has not yet been determined. His hands were filled with grass, which he had torn up by the roots, and his clothing was saturated with water, but the tide had not reached the spot where the body was found. An inquest will be held in Christie's undertaking rooms tomorrow morning by Coroner C. W. Hewson. Noiles was a man of about forty years of age. 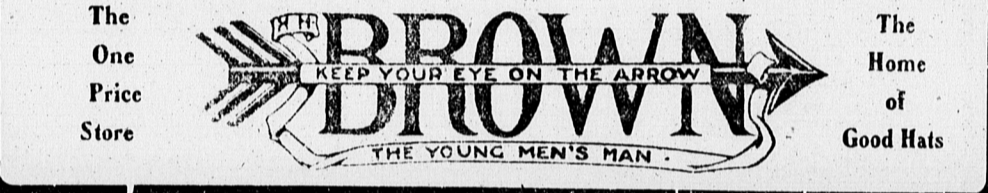
