OTTAWA, June 29—(CP)—At the recent examinations held by the Medical Council of Canada 353 candidates, including 18 women, were successful. Dr. J. Fenion Argue, registrar of the Council, announced tonight. Examinations were held at eight centres throughout the country. Successful candidates may be licensed to practise medicine in any province without further examination upon payment of the necessary fee and compliance with other provincial regulations. PLAN BERRY SHIPMENT TO ENGLAND

Plans are under way, it was learned yesterday, for an experimental shipment of at least a ton of Prince Edward Island strawberries to English jam factories. The fruit will be preserved for transit by the sulphur dioxide process and will be packed in 300 pound barrels. The Provincial Department of Agriculture is arranging to have a Federal Department of Agriculture official come from Kentville to superintend packing of the berries. The shipment is being tried as an experiment in an endeavour to provide a profitable outlet for surplus berries. If the venture is successful it is expected that an increase in strawberry production in the Province will follow. Last year an experimental shipment was made from Nova Scotia and the fruit is said to have met favor with English jam manufacturers. The returns to growers gave a margin of profit. The Provincial Department of Agriculture is understood to be financing the experiment here. Department officials have been in communication with the Canadian Trade Commissioner in London, England, who will assist in placing the berries in the hands of manufacturers.

Daring Rescue Of Baby Robin

REGINA, June 29—To rescue a baby robin, hanging head down, with its feet entangled in the wire, Tom Skaling, 55-year-old linesman, inched his way 50 feet along a cable suspended 40 feet in the air. Wild chirping of the mother robin attracted Skaling's attention to the young bird's plight. "It was easy," Mr. Skaling assured the jittery witnesses of his exploit. He had spent his youth scampering around the rigging of a swaying, tossing sail boat off the Nova Scotia coast.

LATE NEWS FLASHES

NEW YORK, June 29—Frank A. Vanderlip, veteran financier, died in New York Hospital today after an illness of several weeks. He was 72.

DUBLIN, June 29—The Irish Free State's 1,750,000 voters will decide Thursday on President Eamon de Valera's proposed constitution and also elect the 138 members of a revamped parliament.

GLASGOW, June 29—Lord Craigmyle, distinguished jurist whose work as Lord of Appeal and a member of the judicial committee of the Privy Council made him widely known throughout the Empire, died today, aged 87.

MONTREAL, June 29—A convict at St. Vincent de Paul Penitentiary was shot by a guard today at a prison quarry outside the penitentiary walls after an asserted attempt to attack a second guard.

LONDON, June 29—Portugal advised the British Government late today that it had withdrawn the facilities hitherto accorded British observers supervising non-intervention control of its Spanish frontier.

CANTON, Ill., June 29—Fire which burst from a huge paint tub raged for almost two hours through the Canton plant of the International Harvester Company today, causing damage which Adam Condo, superintendent, said might exceed \$100,000.

PREMIER KING TALKS WITH NAZI LEADERS

Discusses Social And Political Problems With Hitler And Colleagues.

BERLIN, June 29—(CP Cable)—Prime Minister Mackenzie King tonight closed a long day of talks with Chancellor Hitler, Rudolph Hess, Hitler's personal deputy to the Nazi Party, and Air Minister Hermann Goering with an evening at the opera. His host tonight was General Goering.

Tomorrow the Canadian Prime Minister interviews Baron Von Neurath, German Foreign Minister, afterwards luncheon with him. Thus will close three days of strenuous effort to understand Nazi Germany. Talks have covered a wide field, both social and political. Under invitation from the German Embassy at London, Mackenzie King has been enabled to see something of modern Germany for himself and learn something of her ruler's viewpoints. In the difficult days which still lie ahead he will be in a better position to determine his attitude on any situation which arises. Previous talks at London and Paris gave the Prime Minister a thorough understanding of the British and French viewpoints. Talks at Berlin, with subsequent conversations at Brussels on Thursday will give him direct contact with the governments of Germany and Belgium. Mackenzie King and Hitler talked for an hour and a quarter in the old home of Paul Von Hindenburg on the Wilhelmstrasse. As he left the Prime Minister said: "All I can say is that it was most interesting and most valuable."

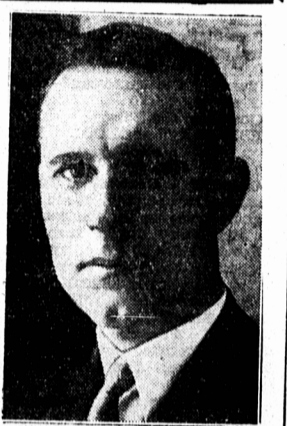
Canadian Artists Miss Opportunity

EDMONTON, June 29—Canadian artists are missing a golden opportunity by not painting the things that are typical of this country, in the opinion of Lady Floud, wife of Sir Francis Floud, British High Commissioner for Canada. She herself is an enthusiastic amateur artist and president of the Ottawa Lumber camp, ice-harvesting and fishing scenes, are typically Canadian and should be capitalized on more widely by Canadian painters. Lady Floud said in an interview here. Mentioning she had done a large oil painting depicting lumberjacks sorting logs on the Gatineau River, she said the lumber men "were very interested in the painting and were quick to tell me if I had any of the technical details of the lumbering wrong."

HALIFAX, June 29—(CP)—Premier Angus L. Macdonald of Nova Scotia tonight issued the following statement following announcement of his Liberal Government had been returned to office in the provincial elections by a 25-5 majority: "The overwhelming support that has been given to the Liberal Party in this election can only be interpreted as an expression of satisfaction with the work which we have accomplished during the past four years and with the program which we have in mind for the future."

SUSPECTS IN TRIPLE SLAYING QUESTIONED

Police Stumped As Clues Fail—Governor Calls On Citizens To Aid In Widespread Hunt.

INGLEWOOD, Calif., June 29—What authorities at first considered their most substantial lead evaporated today, leaving them in a blind alley in their search for the fiend who attacked and killed three young girls. Several hours after the garroted and bruised bodies of Melba Marie Everett, nine, her sister, Madeline Everette, seven, and Jeanette Marjorie Stephens, eight, were found in a Baldwin Hills gulch yesterday, an order was issued for the detention of Othel Leroy Strong, 22.

ABSOLVED OF CRIME

From Sheriff L. C. Huntamer of Olympia, Wash., however, came the information on Strong was working at a tie mill near there and "has been absolved of any connection whatsoever with the killing of three girls at Inglewood, Calif."

The Washington disclosures followed an announcement by officials in San Diego that a man had been captured at nearby Del Mar after fleeing from a train. He was held on a vagrancy charge. Another suspect, Otto R. Rasmussen, 23-year-old longshoreman, was questioned after his arrest at Los Angeles on charges of attacking Miss Carol A. Sims, 20.

District Attorney Byron Flitts quoted Miss Sims as saying Rasmussen told her he had "killed three people already." Rasmussen denied the statement. The alleged attack on Miss Sims occurred Sunday.

Late Saturday morning they were playing in Centinela Park, close by their homes. Then they left some of their playthings and ran across the grounds, calling out they were going to hunt rabbits. By night, County Autopsy Surgeon Dr. A. P. Wagner reported, they had been attacked and murdered. As word of the discovery spread and two manacled suspects were questioned, an angry crowd formed and threats of lynching were heard. A second mob gathered last night.

From Sacramento, Gov. Frank Merriam called upon all law officers and citizens to aid in the apprehension of this killer. "A fiend is loose," he said. "If we are to protect our homes, and especially our children, it is the duty of each of us to see that this maniac-strangler is apprehended that he may be brought to proper and legal justice."

Move To Settle Trinidad Strikes

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 29—(CP Cable)—Trinidad's Government tonight had set the pace for employers in settlement of the Island's fortnight-old general strikes by increases amounting to two cents per hour for a working day reduced from nine to eight hours, in wages paid government employees. Legislation approving the move was passed at an extraordinary session of the executive of the government held today. Even before public announcement of the increases, a number of striking public works laborers resumed operations. Other strikes throughout the Island were deadlocked by persistent refusal of labor to negotiate without inclusion of Uriah Butler, their organizer, in conferences. Butler has been sought by police since June 19 after their arrival to arrest him on agitation charges touched off a riot in which two policemen were killed.

Passenger Train Hits Automobile

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BUCHANAN, Sask., June 29—Five persons met instant death today in a level crossing accident near this point 175 miles east of Saskatoon. The dead, all occupants of an automobile that was struck by a Saskatoon bound Canadian National Railway's passenger train were John Hachakevitch, Sr., 60; Mrs. Hachakevitch, 57; John Hachakevitch Jr., 22; Flossie Hachakevitch, 19, and Alice Podowski, 19.

John Jr. and Flossie Hachakevitch were son and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hachakevitch who farmed in the Tiny settlement and Mrs. Podowski was the daughter of Ben Podowski of Buchanan. The younger Hachakevitch was driving the open car northward on a side road when the accident occurred. The car was approaching the crossing where the driver was said to have a good view. Hachakevitch was not driving fast and it was believed he was attempting to bring the car to a stop when the crash occurred. The car was struck midway between the wheels and carried 150 feet along the track. The bodies were strewn along the right of way.

JAPAN SENDS PROTEST TO SOVIET RUSSIA

Invokes Mutual Assistance Pact Over Alleged Invasion Of Islands.

TOKYO, June 29—The Japanese government invoked the mutual assistance pact between Japan and Manchoukou today and served a vigorous protest on the Soviet Government against the alleged invasion of the Sennuifa and Bolshoi Islands in the Amur River. Members of the Japanese Military High Command said they took a grave view of the situation. Their action, they added, would depend on the tone of the reply from Moscow.

The protest was presented to the Soviet Government by Mamoru Shigemitsu, ambassador to Russia. Japan asserted the islands in the river belong to Manchoukou, and she demanded their immediate evacuation. The Amur River forms the northeastern boundary of the Japanese-occupied state of Manchoukou and Siberia.

French Government Granted Unusual Financial Powers

(By The Canadian Press) PARIS, June 30—(Wednesday)—The Chamber of Deputies early today approved the Chautemps Government's extraordinary financial powers bill by a vote of 380 to 228. The Chamber rejected three amendments which would have qualified the powers the government demands in order to meet the financial crisis. The measure would authorize the Government to promulgate decrees "tending to assure suppression of attacks on government credit, fight against speculation, promote economic recovery, control prices and balance the budget."

LEADER DEFEATED

George Morrison's victory over the Conservative Leader in Cape Breton South was the first personal defeat ever sustained by Col. Harrington.

Although there were approximately 25,000 more names on the voters lists than in 1933, total votes polled were about the same as in that year. Fine weather in most districts aided party workers. Premier Macdonald was given a wild ovation when with others of the Liberal candidates in Halifax, he appeared in the downtown district as return of his government was assured. NO DEPOSITS LGST

No candidates lost their deposits although in some cases the government representatives increased the majorities they had in 1933. The result was never in doubt after the first polls in each riding reported. Highways Minister A. S. MacMillan was re-elected in Hants and another veteran, Minister without portfolio J. W. Comeau in Digby. Attorney-General J. H. MacQuarrie and another Liberal won the Pictou seats; Mines Minister Michael Dwyer was victorious in Cape Breton Centre and Agriculture Minister J. A. MacDonald bested George Nowlan, President of the Nova Scotia Conservative Association, in Kings. Dr. F. R. Davy's, Minister of Health, and a second Liberal won in the famous fishing constituency of Lunenburg.

BLACK ELECTED

Percy C. Black, Highways Minister in the Rhodes-Harrington Conservative government of 1925-33 was elected in Cumberland, but other former cabinet ministers were unsuccessful. J. Fred Fraser who was provincial secretary from 1931-33, lost in Halifax East. Joseph Macdonald a former minister without portfolio, was defeated by George B. Murray, son of the late George B. Murray, Liberal Premier from 1896-1925, in Cape Breton North. Liberals gained seats in Cape Breton North South and West, and in Victoria, all in Cape Breton Island. They lost a seat in Cumberland, where two Conservatives replaced the Liberal and Conservative elected in 1933.
