NEW YORK, Nov. 30. — Bud Taylor of Terre Haute, Ind., generally recognized as the world's bantamweight champion, was suspended indefinitely today by the New York State Athletic Commission for withdrawing from a scheduled fight this Thursday with Tony Canzoneri. Taylor reported an injured hand, but the suspension in such cases is required by the commission's rules regardless of circumstances.

Taylor has been replaced by Ignacio Fernandez as an opponent for Canzoneri.

(1) The bush burning, but not consumed, was an emblem of Israel in the fiery furnace of affliction, yet miraculously surviving all through the centuries. The Jews are a wonder and a sign that the bush is still burning but not consumed.

(2) The Bible a Burning Bush. Vetaire, the noted French infidel who died in 1778 said that in one hundred years from his time Christianity would be swept out of existence yet his printing presses, with which he printed his infidel literature, has since been used to print the word of God.

### Finnigan Defeats Tod Morgan

BOSTON, Dec. 3.—Dick (Honey-boy) Finnigan, Dorchester lightweight, won the decision over Tod Morgan, of Seattle, Wn., world's junior-lightweight champion, in a fast ten-round bout here tonight.

The title was not at stake as both men weighed in at 131 1/2 pounds. Eddie Callahan, of Arlington, won the decision over Elzeur Rioux, of Montreal, in a six-round preliminary.

Note.—Finnigan boxed his first big bout in Halifax about seven years ago.

### New Steamer Brant Arrives

The new steamer "Brant," Captain Basil Kelly, of Summerside, arrived in Charlottetown on Friday afternoon on her maiden voyage from Quebec, having first visited Summerside en route on Tuesday forenoon. She will commence immediately to take up work in the lighthouse and buoy service, so capably performed by her predecessor of the same name since the time of her construction at Charlottetown, 28 years ago last June.

The new Brant is an improvement in many ways over her predecessor. She is a steel-built craft of the trailer type, her strength being 130 feet, and beam 26 feet. She draws 14 1/2 feet of water. The new steamer was built and fitted out at the Marine and Fisheries Shipyard at Sorel, for the increased work in connection with the lighthouse and buoy services and everything about her is absolutely new and up-to-date. She is fitted with the very latest gear made for the landing of light-house equipment and navigating appliances.

The Brant is fitted with triple expansion 500 horse power steam engines of the very latest type. The equipment includes a Wetters feed-water heater, independent feed pump and filter which cleans the water before it goes to the boiler. Speaking tubes connect the engine-room with the wheel-house, a notable improvement which was lacking in the old Brant. There is a general service pump used for the purpose of cleaning decks, pumping out bilges, filling and clearing out the tanks, as well as the circulating pump found in all steel ships.

The steamer has an excellent electric equipment. The dynamo was built by the Sunderland Forge Company in the Old Country and supplies direct current most satisfactory.

The quarters for the officers are wonderfully neat and compact and conveniently arranged. The Captain's quarters are a decided advancement over those in the old Brant, being quite roomy and bright, all furnishings being of the most modern style.

The other officers' rooms are all very neatly laid out and the quarters cozy and complete and the same holds true of those of the stewards and cooks. A noteworthy innovation is the officers' toilet and bathroom accommodation. The wheel-house is an exceptionally commodious and well-appointed compartment, the equipment being first-class in every respect.

The steamer left Sorel on Thursday, calling at Gaspe, to make some slight engine repairs. She averaged a speed of 9 1/2 knots on the trip coming down.

The Brant's crew with one exception is composed of P. E. Islanders. The officers are as follows: Captain Basil Kelly; Chief Officer, Archibald Campbell; Chief Engineer, Howard MacDonald; Second Engineer, Frank Batt; Third Engineer, Alphonse Buffard; Steward, Edward Burns; Bosun, Harry Simmonds.

If the new steamer carries out the duties she was built for as well as the old Brant, she will prove a very serviceable craft.

The old Brant, as stated, was built at Charlottetown, 28 years ago and is of all-wood construction and is a credit to her builder, Mr. John White, a former Prince George man. She cost \$16,000. Although the work for which she was built has expanded so that a larger vessel was required the old Brant's timbers are still sound and the workmanship put into her has proved substantial.

Mr. Albert Blanchard, who was accompanied for all the numbers, also favored the guests with an admirable piano solo.

At the close Rev. Mother Superior in thanking Miss Hornby for the pleasure she and her pupils had afforded the Sisters complimented her on the manner in which her pupils had acquitted themselves. The Reverend Sister also paid a worthy tribute to Miss Hornby as a teacher, the work of her pupils showing clearly the conscientious work of the teacher.

### Present State Of Fisheries

The inspector of fisheries, Mr. Gallant, interviewed recently by the Guardian's representative concerning the present condition of the fisheries stated that not very much cod was being caught at present. What catch there was, was being secured at Tracadie and Souris.

The smelts are scarce this year, but prices are good. The Bag Net fishery for them went into force on Thursday last, but on account of the fact that there is almost no ice in the rivers, very little has been done.

The oyster fishing season ended on October twenty-fifth. The catch was about the same as last year. There is a good demand in the Upper Provinces, and it will absorb the whole of our catch. Prices range from \$13.00 to \$16.00 per barrel, depending on size. The North Shore oysters are superior in flavour, but practically none of them are available, though the celebrated beds in Malpeque Bay— from which used to be obtained the finest oysters in the world—are slowly beginning once more to recover from the effects of the disease which killed all the oysters in them some fifteen years ago.

Mr. Gallant is glad to be able to say that the oysters, particularly in the beds located in the rivers flowing into Hillsborough Bay, are increasing in number. Incidentally, he added, no oysters are shipped from either Prince or King's Counties, but only from Queen's.

With regard to lobsters, they are gradually decreasing in numbers. Mr. Gallant is of the opinion, that, in order to safeguard this important fishery, there should be an upper and lower limit to the size of lobsters permitted to be caught. No lobster should be taken ashore which is under six inches, or over four inches in length. And it would be still better if the lower limit were eventually fixed at eight, rather than six inches.

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### New International and Interprovincial Long Distance Rates

In order to conform with the practice now uniform almost everywhere else on this Continent, telephone calls to points outside of Prince Edward Island will be classified on and after December 1st, 1927, according to the following method:

### STATION-TO-STATION SERVICE

Station to Station service should be used when you are willing to talk to ANYONE at the distant telephone—that is, when you do not need to get a particular person on the line. This is the cheapest form of service.

### REDUCED EVENING AND NIGHT SERVICE

The rates for Station-to-Station calls are subject to substantial reductions if the calls are placed during the evening or night.

The EVENING RATE which is effective from 7.00 to 8.30 p. m., is about 75 per cent of the day rate.

The NIGHT RATE, which is effective from 8.30 p. m. to 4.30 a. m., is about 50 per cent of the day rate.

### PERSON-TO-PERSON SERVICE

When you make a call specifying that conversation is desired with a particular person in a given exchange, Person-to-Person service is used.

As this service requires greater operating labor and circuit time than Station-to-Station service, the rate is about 25 per cent higher than the Station-to-Station rate.

### APPOINTMENT AND MESSENGER SERVICE

Appointment service and Messenger service are special kinds of person-to-person service.

An APPOINTMENT CALL rate, which is about 50 per cent higher than the station-to-station rate, is quoted when you make a call and specify that you will speak to a particular person at a specified future time.

The MESSENGER CALL rate is charged when you place a long distance call for a person who cannot be reached by telephone and must be sent for by messenger. This rate is about 50 per cent, higher than the Station-to-Station rate, and to it is added the cost of the messenger.

### THE REPORT CHARGE

When you place a call for a particular person, and for any reason he cannot be reached the same day, or will not talk, or if you make a call and you are not ready to talk when the called person is ready within an hour, a REPORT CHARGE is made. The report charge is about one-fourth the station-to-station rate. It is intended to cover part of the expense of handling the uncompleted call.

The Standard System, as above, will not apply to calls between points within this Province. These will remain as at present.
