WINNIPEG, Man., Dec. 9.—With \$1,000,000 worth of lithium ore blocked out in the Point du Bois area on the Winnipeg river, about 50 miles northeast of Winnipeg, the Silver Leaf Mining syndicate (Canada) Limited, will start regular shipments to Bradford, England, this winter, according to T. P. Ball, secretary of the company.

Dr. Kennedy of the Maywood Chemical Works, Maywood, N. J., has reported favorably on the properties, declaring them to be the best of forty or fifty he had ever examined. Other notable engineers to report favorably on the ores are E. Hill, F. R. S., a well-known British chemical engineer; Dr. J. F. Wright, of the federal department of mines and Prof. G. Stockwell, of the University of Wisconsin, a specialist in raw minerals.

The Silver Leaf syndicate is financed by a group of businessmen in Bradford, who have changed the concern from a private undertaking to a limited liability enterprise and are raising more capital to develop and enlarge their undertaking.

Surface exploration will be extended with the moving of overburden and further tracing of the deposit. The ore is being removed from the mine by open quarrying and is within ten miles of steel at Point du Bois.

A roller mill is to be installed to prepare 60 to 80 mesh lithium next year. The refining plant is located at Bradford, Eng., and will be moved to Manitoba as soon as the volume of business warrants.

Lithium ores are used in making lithia water, a curative agent for gout and rheumatism; in the manufacture of dyes, glassware, plate glass, photographic goods, storage batteries, electric lights, enamel ware, white porcelain, bathroom fixtures and flare rockets. Inquiries are being received about the deposits from England, Germany, Holland and the United States.

Lithium Orr Shipped To England

Hon. J. C. Douglas En-counter Charges

(Canadian Press.)
HALIFAX, N. S., Dec. 9.—Hon. J. C. Douglas, former attorney-general for Nova Scotia, and present member-elect for Antigonish Gully in the House of Commons, whose election in that constituency was by a small majority has been challenged by Colin F. McIsaac, the defeated Liberal candidate, in the form of a petition charging improper practices in conducting his campaign, appeared before the Supreme Court yesterday afternoon and signed a petition of counter-charges against his opponent. According to the law governing such a court procedure the members-elect concerned must appear in person within a time limit to sign the petition of charges. The time limit expired at four o'clock yesterday afternoon, and Hon. Mr. Douglas appeared at the Court House just one minute to four. The charges contained in the writ are almost identical with those brought against Mr. Douglas by Mr. McIsaac some weeks ago, and include conveying and finding meat and drink for voters; using undue influence to persuade those qualified to vote not to do so, and persuading those not qualified to vote to do so. Bribery, promises of employment and treating and threats. Twenty, more or less prominent people are named in the writ, including Hon. E. M. MacDonald, former Minister of National Defense; Hon. William Chisholm, leader of the opposition in the Nova Scotia Legislature; Hon. A. D. MacMillan, Halifax, and Dr. John L. McIsaac, Antigonish. In addition to the twenty named the writ refers to "divers others."

CANADA'S YOUNGEST BISHOP

Once again Canada has reason to be proud of one of her Rhodes scholars. The career of the Very Rev. Dean Sherman, whose Rhodes scholarship dates back only to the year 1909, has recently culminated in his election to the Bishopric of western Canada. He will be Canada's youngest bishop, as he is only forty years of age.

For a short time he was Dean of Quebec and rector of the beautiful old historical cathedral in Canada's city of romance. Before that he was rector of Holy Trinity Church in Toronto for eight years, and it was with genuine regret that Toronto saw him depart to his new field. His brief period of work in Quebec shows much progress in vitalizing the church life.

To Cross Atlantic By Airplane

Dean Sherman possesses some sort of magic touch that brings new life to everything he undertakes, and his popularity is easily understood by any one who knows him.

He was born in Fredericton, N.B., and the tale runs that when he was four years old he announced to all and sundry that he was going to be a bishop. He graduated from the University of New Brunswick, then went to Lennoxville, and from there to Oxford as a Rhodes scholar. In Oxford he took his degree with the highest honors, and was ordained by the Bishop of London. After a curacy at the Christ Church Oxford Mission he organized, under the direct authority of the Bishop of London, the New College Mission at Notting Hill, London—a real London mission. Later he returned to Holy Trinity Church at Saint John, N.B., as rector, and in 1917 he went to one of Toronto's oldest and most interesting churches—the Church of the Holy Trinity. Now, from ancient Quebec, he goes to the new country of Alberta, and head of the diocese of Calgary. The prophecy of the four-year-old boy came true, and Dean Sherman will make good in the west for he is a very human person with a great zest for life and for his fellow-men. His meteoric career is exactly what one would expect from him, but he himself receives every new honor that is offered him with great surprise. "But there are such a lot of other men—" is his invariable remark.

Munce-Simonich Fight Stopped

NEWARK, N. J., Dec. 9.—Monte Munn, former Nebraska football star, stopped Gordon Munce of New York, in the second round of a 10-round heavyweight match preliminary to the Pete Latzo-Joe Simonich fight at the Newark Armories last night. The referee interrupted hostilities to save Munce from further punishment after he had been felled eight times by the mid-Westerner's heavy blows. Munn weighed 213½ and Munce 205½.

CANADA'S RAYON INDUSTRY

Canada is moving forward in the rayon industry, or the making of artificial silk, and her future is bright with promise; bearing in mind her vast resources of timber, that form the raw material of the rayon fabric. A report issued by the National Resources Intelligence Service of the Department of the Interior shows much progress in recent years.

As, per example, Courtlands Limited, the largest manufacturers of the product in the United Kingdom, have a \$2,500,000 plant in Cornwall. The Celanese Limited, a \$7,000,000 plant at Drummondville, Que. The Howard Smith Paper Mills have formed a subsidiary company called the Canadian Cellulose Co., to be operated in Cornwall, Ont., and the B. C. Pulp and Paper Company is carrying on chemical research into the use of hemlock, with good results to date. Other concerns are reported to be making preliminary moves towards establishing plants.

California Has Earthquake Shock

CALIFORNIA, Calif., Dec. 9.—A series of five earthquakes, two of them very pronounced, shook California today, but no property damage was reported. The tremors started at about 4:05 this afternoon and came at four-minute intervals. Mexicali, Lower California, across the boundary in Mexico, also felt the shocks.

EGG LAYING CONTEST

NOTES ON THE 9TH P. E. ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 5TH WEEK, ENDING DECEMBER 6, 1926.

The past week though so stormy quite a number of the pens got well under way in the contest. Four pens have nine hens laying. Mr. H. C. Muttart's pen of B. R. lead the contest for the week with 39 eggs. Mr. Wm. Coughlan's pen of B. R. were second with 33 eggs. Mrs. J. F. Easton's Leghorns and the Experimental Farm pen of Leghorns were third with 32 eggs each. Mr. Harold Laird's B. R. were fourth with 23 eggs and Mr. M. Cutcliffe's pen of B. R. were fifth with 21 eggs.

Mr. H. C. Muttart's pen of B. R. leads the contest to date with 79 eggs (72.8 points); Experimental Station pen of W. L. are second with 84 eggs (52.4 points); Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B. R. are third with 67 eggs (50.5 points); Experimental Station pen of B. R. are fourth with 63 eggs (40 points) and Mrs. J. F. Easton's pen of W. L. are fifth with 58 eggs (38.3 points); Mr. Wm. Coughlan's B. R. are sixth with 57 eggs (35.3 points); Mr. M. Cutcliffe's B. R. are seventh with 51 eggs (31.6 points); Mr. Harold Laird's pen of B. R. are eighth with 40 eggs (27.6 points). The total number of eggs laid during the week was 296.
