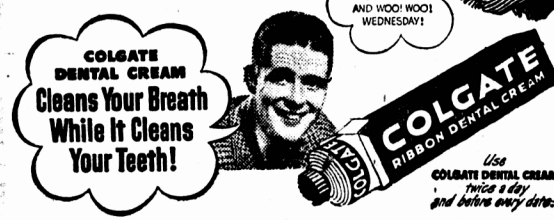

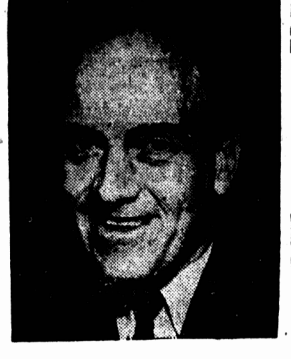


CHERRY HILL CHRISTMAS CONCERT

Noted Planner To Plot Design of U. N. Home

A 51-year-old architect whose pencils have sketched out some of the world's biggest building developments is now directing the planning for the Headquarters of the United Nations. He is tall, vigorous Wallace K. Harrison, recently-appointed Director of Planning for U. N.'s 17-acre capital site in east-side New York. With a Board of Design Consultants, Harrison will work against a July 1 deadline in tracing out his ideas, some of which previously

contributed to the designs of the 1939-40 World's Fair, Radio City and the still-uncompleted Idlewild Airport in New York and the Avila Hotel in Caracas, Venezuela. Harrison emphasizes, however, that he isn't alone on his U. N. job. The Board of Design Consultants, made up of top-ranking technicians from many nations, will assist him, while the viewpoint of U. N. member nations will be brought out by the Headquarters Advisory Committee.

Although he is an architect first, Harrison is no newcomer to international affairs. In 1941, he joined the U. S. Office of Coordinator of Inter-American Affairs and when he left four years later to go back to architecture, he was its director. Back of Harrison's architectural ability is education which included study at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris and at the American Academy in Rome. In addition to years of private work, he taught at Columbia and Yale Universities. He is now president of the Architectural League of New York.

Harrison lives with his wife and fifteen-year-old daughter on a Long Island farm, where he personally conducts many agricultural experiments.

New Shooting Manual Better Than Earlier Ones

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—(CP)—With the aid of "Little Chief Wildshot," the Musketry Grammar, the Army has come out with a handbook on rifle shooting that marks a sharp and cheerful departure from the dry, dogmatic manuals of other days.

It is called "Shoot and Live" and its author is Lt.-Col. Stephen Johnson of Calgary, a 42-year-old teacher by profession who represented Canada at Bisley five times and served as a weapon-training officer during the war. It gives his methods as the adopted methods of the peacetime Canadian Army.

The book is bright and readable, marches forward from phase to phase, has copious illustrations but its ultimate touch rests in "Little Chief Wildshot," the pot-bellied, long-nosed Indian who points out a multitude of errors, gives a multitude of laughs in the sketches of former CSM, J. A. Houston of Toronto. Col. Johnson implies that the Canadian marksman lost something between the two world wars, that the rifleman of Italy and Normandy didn't compare with his father of Ypres and Vimy Ridge. His aim is to restore that position.

Lush Valentines Recall Gay 90s

TORONTO, Jan. 20 — (CP)—Frillier and fluffier than last year's, the 1947 valentines went on sale here today. Clerks said coyly-bird buyers preferred the lacy, be-ribboned old fashioned variety for which prices ranged to \$1 and the volume of sales suggested that the number of valentines to be carried over this year might break all records.

A Canadian Press survey of manufacturers and card counters showed that last year's trend toward lush, fancy valentines has been carried over to this season. The most elaborate cards carry delicately-perfumed sachets under silken screens. Medium-priced lines bear sprinklings of "diamond dust"—the glittery material on cards—as well as ribbons tied by hand.

Verses are sweet and sentimental again this year with the true love running through all the cards. The price is \$1 or two-for-a-nickel. They are some comic lines but the "sour" kind people sometimes used to poke fun at acquaintances is out altogether. In less expensive lines, cutouts and animated cards cater to the tastes of the boys and girls. Some cards are inscribed to parents and to teachers but most are addressed simply "to my valentine."

SELL WAR GOODS IN RECORD TIME

CANBERRA, Jan. 21 —(CP)—In record time, the Australian War Disposals Commission is completing the biggest job ever undertaken by a private or government business organization in Australia. A federal government agency, the commission with its staff of 600, including public servants in key positions, has sold about 80 per cent of the country's surplus material at auction sales in Australia, New Guinea and Papua, and the Solomon Islands. The commission is expected to finish in about two years the work which the government had estimated would take more than twice as long. So far the sales have yielded \$226,000,000.
