THE ADJOURNMENT.

The adjournment of the Legislature for two weeks in the midst of an already long session is an unusual occurrence. The House has already sat out the length of an average session and yet not a dollar has been voted for the public services of the Province. It is an open secret that these extraordinary conditions are brought about by the uncertainty as to the amount of the expected increase of subsidy from Ottawa. That our revenue is considerably short of the necessary living expenses of the Province has been demonstrated by the failure of both parties in succession to keep the expenditure within the limits of income. At the same time we find the sister Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick recovering old claims for large amounts against the Central Government while the undoubtedly just claims of P. E. Island remain unsatisfied.

No Provincial Finance Minister can very well make his estimates of the expenditure for the public services of the year without knowing approximately what the available income will be. He must cut his garment according to the cloth. We have a just claim for many thousands against Ottawa, where the treasury overflows, and it was hoped that a definite recognition of our claim would ere this have been given. No doubt there are difficulties at the Ottawa end of the negotiations, for the other Provinces are exceedingly jealous of any disturbance of the financial basis on which the union rests. If one Province is to receive an increased allowance the other Provinces at once demand a quid pro quo. It is and will be always more difficult for a small Province than for a larger one to secure its just due.

It is regrettable that the Legislature should be compelled to adjourn before its work is completed and to re-assemble in the very busiest season of the year. But we may rest assured that this step has not been taken without some sufficient reason. No reason been officially assigned we are left to guess the cause, and we think it will be found that we are not far astray in this matter. Sir John Macdonald once remarked that all Governments are desirous to have the supplies for the public services voted as speedily as possible and then to send the members of the Legislature to their homes. This is generally true, and we have no doubt is true of the Provincial Government at the present time.

Time's revenges are brought about in various and strange ways. It was strange that a Bonaparte should ever become a general in the Russian army, as happened to Prince Louis Bonaparte some years ago. And it is still more remarkable that the so-called Prince should now be married, as is reported, to a grand Duchess of Russia and a cousin of the Czar. The hopes of the Bonapartist faction in France are naturally centred in one of that name who may possess some of the military qualities of the great Napoleon. Prince Victor is the recognized heir to the Bonapartist pretensions, to which pretensions republican France is hostile, but his claims, such as they are might be easily set aside in favor of his younger brother. It is strange that republican France should have been so friendly for a decade past with her autocratic and traditional enemy, Russia. It is stranger still that while this friendship is continued, a Bonaparte should be allied by marriage to the family of the Czar. It may be that Russian diplomacy, which is so patient and far-seeing, anticipates a time when capricious France will again demand an Emperor, and is training a Bonaparte of her own for the post when the times come round.

Closely following THE GUARDIAN'S reference of yesterday to the nuisances on the road leading to and from the ferry, comes the notice of the Commissioner of Public Works "that all parties having any of the described nuisances or obstructions placed on any public road are notified to have them removed within three days, otherwise proceedings will be commenced for the removal of the same." The new Road Act lays down a penalty of \$20 for placing a nuisance or obstruction, and \$20 additional if the same is not removed within three days of the time of notification to do so. The Commissioner's action will meet with general commendation by the travelling public.
