ANNUAL MEETING W. F. M. S.—At the annual meeting of St. James Church Auxiliary of the Women's Missionary Society on Tuesday afternoon, the members with deep regret bade farewell to their retiring President, Mrs. Rogers of Government House, whose enthusiasm and devotion to the cause of Missions are well known to all. ISLAND BOY IMPROVING.—The many friends of Pte. Samuel E. Chandler, 13th Battalion, 6th Royal Highlanders, will be pleased to hear that he is doing well at the General Infirmary, Stafford, England. It will be remembered that young Chandler was one of the first to enlist for overseas service. At that time he was Sergeant in the Pownal Company, 82nd Regiment. On being reminded that he was under age he replied that was no fault of his: "The tape says I am big enough and I will be old enough before the war is over." After going to Salisbury Plains he got transferred to the 5th Royal Highlanders as a short cut to the front. In that he was not disappointed, for his Regiment went to France in February. For three months he has been in active service at the front and has been in all the principal engagements during that time, some of them the worst in the history of the world.

SHEEP DIPPING.—On Tuesday Mr. W. R. Shaw, District Representative for Queens County and Mr. Leo McDonald went to Iona where they gave the first of a series of sheep dipping demonstrations. Rev. M. J. Smith of Iona has for some time past been taking a great interest in the Agricultural welfare of his parish and invited the sheep owners to have their sheep dipped. Accordingly, about four hundred went through the Tank on Tuesday afternoon after which the outfit was moved to another section in his parish, Newton Cross. Mr. Shaw then returned to town to arrange for further demonstrations while Mr. McDonald went on with the outfit. Next week the Demonstrations will be as follows: on Monday at Donald McPhee's, Duncedin; Tuesday at Paul McPhee, Jr., New Argyle; Wednesday at Duncan Darrach's, Canoe Cove; Thursday at J. A. McDougald's Argyle Shore and Friday at near Abner Crosby's, Bonshaw. Everyone is invited to bring in their sheep but all sheep must be shorn before being dipped.
