Though construction work on the new Prince of Wales College building has been held up six weeks due to delay in arrival of cut building stone, the contracting firm, Stewart Construction Company, hopes to have work completed in schedule time, and to have the building ready for opening about the first of the coming year. Practically all material to be used on the building is now on the site of operations, and if weather conditions are favourable, the work will now go forward with the greatest speed possible. Work in the basement has been completed, and activities are now centered on the first floor. The brick work has been raised on the average to about six feet above ground level, and about half of the window frames have been placed in position. Plumbing is up to schedule. Seventeen bricklayers were employed yesterday, and a number are expected in from the country momentarily. Eighty-five men are employed on the job at the present time, but it is expected that about one hundred and twenty will be at work by the end of next week, when a full crew will be taken on. Local labour is employed almost exclusively, as will be seen from the fact that out of the 85 men now engaged, only six bricklayers are non-residents of the province.
