QUEBEC ACES ELIMINATE MONCTON MAROONS

Two Third Period Goals Advances Quebec Titlists Along Allan Cup Trail

MONCTON, N.B., March 28—(CP)—Quebec Aces hurdled the first barrier on their path to the Allan Cup and the Canadian amateur hockey championship tonight with a 3-1 victory over Moncton Maroons that gave them the best-of-three series in the first round playdowns for the trophy in two straight games. Aces won the first game here Saturday night, 2-1.

Two third period goals fired by Tondreau and Gauthier gave Aces their margin of victory. From there on—the two goals came little more than four minutes apart, the last one at 14:51—Aces flung up a defensive barrier that Maroons could not penetrate.

Slave Off Attack

Even when they were reduced a man by penalty to Johnny Taugher, the Quebec champions hid enough in reserve to repulse the frantic Moncton offensive that threatened to sweep everything before it in the last five minutes but just didn't succeed.

Maroons took a one-goal lead less than two minutes after the first intermission when Charlie Phillips, burly rearguard, banged one past Bolduc. It lasted 10 minutes. O'Connell evaded it up 12:55 and from then on the Maritime titleholders saw their best efforts baffled.

With a two-man advantage, Maroons swarmed in on the Quebec goal but gave Aces once before the Aces were at full strength again. Many of their attacks fumbled on the hard-checking Quebec defence. The ones that didn't were turned aside by the agile Bolduc.

At that, Maroons greatest margin in play came in this period. Moncton's "kid line" Bell-Appleby and Babe LeBlanc stopped many of the Quebec team's attacks at centre ice with poke-checking that disorganized the Aces' forwards before they could get going properly.

A loose puck that Jack O'Connell scooped up gave Aces their first goal. He picked it up in full stride at the Moncton blue line, bore down on Harris almost unhampered by Maroons' defence.

The third period started slowly, Quebec impetus that produced two goals and ended with a blazing Maroon drive in the last five minutes that did everything but score.

The break Aces were awaiting came when Len LeBlanc was penalized just after the 12-minute mark. Aces sent on Tondreau, Martin and Stenge to replace the O'Connell-Wing-McIntyre line and the trio produced a goal in 30 seconds. Tondreau got it, firing Martin's rebound past Harris as the latter was on his knees after blocking Martin's shot.

Aces didn't need another goal the way things turned out, but they got it anyway. Just after LeBlanc returned and the Maroons power plays were in full swing, the Quebec team's attacks at centre ice broke away. Gauthier shot the goal with Taugher and O'Connell rearguard assists on the play.

Maroons tried hard in the remaining five minutes but the Aces' defence was too strong.

Perth Juniors Defeat Verdun

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 28—Perth Blue Wings turned on a three-goal offensive in the last period tonight to gain a 6-4 win over Verdun Maple Leafs in the curtain-raiser of their eastern semi-final series in the Memorial Cup hockey playdowns.

Favored to take the series after ousting the Maritime champions from Halifax, Blue Wings stepped into a lead in the opening period and were never headed, though Verdun drew even with the eastern Ontario crew late in the second period.

The win put Perth into a commanding spot to take the series. The rest of the best-in-three round will be played at Ottawa, where they trimmed Halifax Canadians. The survivors will go against Sudbury Wolves or Ottawa Generals in the eastern Canadian final.

Siebert Only Carry-over From Last Year On N.H.L. All Star Team

(By A. E. Fulford, Canadian Press Staff Writer) TORONTO, March 28—Packing a shabby threat as right wing through a tie vote, the Canadian Press eighth annual National Hockey League all-star teams were announced tonight.

Hockey writers in N. H. L. cities who made the selections were unable to agree whether Cecil Dillon of New York Rangers or Gordon Drillon of Toronto Maple Leafs is hockey's best right winger.

In the only deadlock since the Canadian Press teams were first selected in 1931 they bracketed the two players on first and alternate teams sweepingly changed from last season's.

Only Babe Siebert of the 1937 all-star first team was returned to his post by the 31 critics voting. They balloted drastic rebuilding of the alternate team, too, retaining only Earl Siebert of Chicago Black Hawks in that lineup.

The eighth annual Canadian Press All-Star teams follows: Toronto Team: Goal, Thompson; Boston; R. Defence, Shore, Boston; Left Defence, Siebert, Canadiens; Centre, Cowley, Boston; E. Wing, Drillon, Toronto and Dillon, Rangers (tie); Left Wing, Thompson, Chicago; Coach, Patrick, Rangers.

Alternate Team: Goal, Kerr, Rangers; R. Defence, Cowley, Rangers; L. Defence, Selbert, Chicago; Centre, Apps, Toronto; R. Wing, Dillon, Rangers and Drillon, Toronto; L. Wing, Blake, Canadiens; Coach, Boston.

Coach of seven of the eight Canadian Press teams, Lester Patrick comes back to lead the new All-Star aggregation, after giving space on year to Jack Adams of Detroit Red Wings.

Around him he finds a team of superb defensive power and attacking strength. From tall Tiny Thompson to league scudde and brother Paul, at left wing, the team is a well-balanced unit, brimming with experience and sparked with youthful fire.

Red Wings Ousted
Swept out of the all-star picture were Detroit Red Wings who dominated the 1937 team. The world champions' collapse was reflected in the disappearance of Norm Smith, Ebbie Goodfellow, and the late Lester Patrick.

Out of the all-star scene with them went Harry Jackson of Toronto Maple Leafs who was placed on the first team in 1937 with Siebert and the four Detroiters.

The battle Drillon and Dillon started for scoring honors through much of the league scudde and its counterpart in their struggle for the right wing spot. But while Drillon outdistanced the New Yorker in the scoring race, the writers presumably considered Dillon's greater backchecking ability balanced the Toronto player's edge in attacking punch.

Both are newcomers to the first team. Dillon becomes the first American-born player to reach the dizzy heights of all-star recognition. He was born in Toledo, O.

Honor For Maritimes
Drillon brings the Maritimes to the team for the first time in his sophomore year as a Toronto Leaf. The 22-year-old Moncton player's selection is a reward for having led the league all season in scoring. It brings him a bonus offered by Manager Conny Smythe to any of his players making the first team.

Bruins On Spot In Game At Boston Tonight

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, March 28—Full of confidence now they are "topdogs" in the betting, Toronto Maple Leafs left tonight for Boston to resume battling there with the bruising Bruins for a National Hockey League title that is almost within their grasp.

Only casually in the Leaf camp is Harvey Jackson, ace left wing who suffered a badly-sprained left arm in the second game, which Leafs won 2-1, of the best-of-five series for the N.H.L. title and a spot in the Stanley Cup final. Leafs also won the first game 1-0.

Bruins may be without the services of Ray Gelfin for the third game. Gelfin suffered a gashed foot in the second tilt Saturday night.

Map Plan For European Tour

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 28—(CP)—Cecil Hart announced plans for a barnstorming hockey tour of Europe by his Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings were pretty close to completion.

Only hitch in the arrangements now, the Habitués Manager said, was weather and National Hockey League teams were to sail from Halifax or New York. The Canadiens were to play exhibition games there and at Sydney, N. S., where they drew big crowds last spring.

That difficulty will be smoothed over without much trouble, though Hart said. He expects the teams to sail next week. Manager Jack Adams of Detroit told him today the Wings were ready.

Each team will carry 11 men. Of the Canadiens, Wilf Cude, Babe Siebert, Walter Buswell, Paul Haynes, Johnny Gagnon, Gorge Manly, the Pit Lepine, Toe Blake and Red Lormain have agreed to go along. Aurel Joliat has been invited but he and Marty Burke, who is in hospital, may not go. If they don't, the other pair will be picked from Joffre Desjardis, Polly Druin, Red Goupile and Armand Raymond.

Junior Abbies Defeat All Star Senior Team In Harry Benefit Game

Junior Abbies, flashing the form that carried them to the junior championship of N. B.-P. E. I. last night skated off with a 6-4 victory over an all-star senior team in the Robert Harry benefit game staged at the Porty rink here.

Witnessed by upwards of 2,000 fans the game was a thriller from start to finish. Gaining a 2-1 lead in the first period, the Juniors argued further ahead in the middle canto as they shot two goals without a return from their opponents and then in a fast windup session held their more experienced and older opponents even to a n-g-n their victory.

Just about four minutes after the start of the game the Juniors started their victory march with Ev Jay feeding Rex Flannigan a scoring pass. Two minutes later Wilf Whalen went through alone to make the count read 1-1. Just after the halfway mark of the period, however, Tarky Whitlock again put the Juniors in front with a smart goal.

Junior outplay their opponents during the middle session to increase their lead to three goals. At 8:55 Whitlock took Bud McEachern's pass to make the score read 3-1 and before the session had ended Jimmy Roach made it 4-1 on a well-timed pass from George MacLeod.
