Compares Rights Of British Women

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 1.—(CP)—Comment on the Women's Charter drawn up by the Married Women's Association in Britain, is made in the Cape Argus by Advocate Maggie Abowitz.

Legal disabilities of South African women she said, had been referred to by General Smuts, minister of justice, who, during last session had promised an investigation into them with a view to amending legislation. He had repeated this promise more than once during the election.

In England the Married Women's Property Act secured her property to a married woman. No such right was recognized in South Africa, except where the bride had gone to the expense of protecting herself with the full ante-nuptial contract. Many women failed to do this. As a consequence a woman living apart from her husband and working to support her family, was obliged by law to hand over her earnings to the husband if he asked for them.

Akin to a woman's right to her earnings, outside the home was the recognition of the value of her services in it. No woman's organization, as far as she knew, had yet put forward such a claim, but it was neither unheard of or impractical. There was a country in Europe with a nationally supported School for Wives. Wives became entitled to payment for their domestic services and received their wages. Law in South Africa excluded women from the Civil Service and the teaching profession, so limiting opportunities for married women to do remunerative work outside their homes.
