Veteran Seal Hunter Takes Fleet To Sea

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., March 2.—When Capt. Abraham Keen leads Newfoundland's 1934 sealing fleet seaward next week he will be seeking a personal record besides directing the eight sealers to the most advantageous positions in the northern fields.

In his 79th year, the jovial commodore hopes to increase his total to the million mark. For 62 years he has been "going on the ice" and in the 68 trips made during that time he has brought back 960,000 seals.

Other veterans declare that if the Commodore succeeds in striking "the main patch" he will stand a good chance of reaching his mark.

Transferring from the Terra Nova, an ice-scarred wooden steamer that has been butting the floes of the north and south Atlantic since 1865, the Commodore this year will hoist his colors on the Beothic, a steel ship. And the colors are new, presented to Captain Keen last spring by Governor Sir David Murray, Anderson.

Captain Keen received his first command of a sealing steamer in 1866, when he took out the Wolf. In the seventh successive voyage of that ship she was lost. His next was the Hope; then in succession, the Aurora, for eight trips; Terra Nova for three; Forisul, for three; Stephano, three; back to Forisul for two; Terra Nova again for several years; next the Neopole; and back to the Terra Nova again, and now the Beothic.

Fish And Game Ass'n. Meeting

At the quarterly meeting of the Fish and Game Association last evening, Mr. Harry Tidmarsh was elected president to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Mr. Gilbert Gaudet. Mr. Earl Ings was elected Vice-President. The sympathy of the Association was extended to Mrs. Gaudet and family in their bereavement.

Mr. Tidmarsh expressed regret on the circumstances that made it necessary for him to preside, the death of Mr. Gaudet, who had been a member of the Association for 31 years, and who had always worked for the benefit of the organization.

BELIEVE MAXIMUM PRICE REACHED

Exceptional Volume of P. E. I. Potato Shipments This Winter.

Potato shipments this winter have been much larger than in other years, when the movement of seed for instance, did not begin until March reports Major C. G. Thompson, assistant manager of the P. E. I. Seed Potatoes Association. He anticipates considerable demand from the United States, particularly in Maine, where they want the Island potatoes as foundation stock, and there will also be a considerable movement to Upper Canada to the Maritimes. "I believe," said Major Thompson, "that shipping will be carried on until the entire crop will be moved. The price is much higher than last year's market, but will continue to rise in a healthy condition, but under the circumstances, I would not care to predict that the prices will be higher on table or seed stock. Orderly marketing of the crop now is better than holding till later in the anticipation of the market improving."

At present in Prince Edward Island the price for certified seed Cobblers is 75 cents and for Green Mountains 65 cents. The table stock is from 55 to 60 cents according to the quality. Turnips are quoted at 30 cents.

Major Thompson expressed the belief that the prevailing prices in Prince Edward Island have reached the maximum and are all that the market will stand. The seed buying centres are rapidly covering their requirements, and when these are met, automatically there will be no demand for seed, and even in a subsiding market, the price will tend to go on the market as table stock.

Austro-German Peace Pact Rumor Causes Surprise

Newspaper Report Denied In Authoritative German Circles.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) VIENNA, March 2.—The announcement that the Austrian constitution has been superseded by "natural law" and a report of imminent peace between Austria and Germany took Austrians by surprise today.

Vice-Chancellor Emil Fey's newspaper published a dispatch from Rotterdam in which a Dutch correspondent said an Austro-German peace pact was close, and it was taken for granted that the powerful Fey would not allow his paper to print the story unless he is at least willing to spread the rumor.

More specifically, it has been rumored here for days that General von Epp, German plenipotentiary in the German state of Bavaria will come to confer with the Vice-Chancellor. Another report was that the General already has talked with Fey in Vienna.

Robert Hecht, Government adviser and expert in constitutional law, declared in the official newspaper that the present situation may last several weeks.

Authoritative German circles scoffed at reports about the Austro-German peace pact. General von Epp's visit had the opinion expressed that the "present uncertain situation may last several weeks."

He criticized the government's economy programme, declaring it was not saving money. Employees had been dismissed, he said, but it had not been for economy purposes. "If we are going to do away with men, don't let us make a sham of it," he declared. The administration had "concentrated more on dismissals than on the public service."

The Conservative leader criticized the announcement contained in the speech from the Throne that the province faced the largest deficit in its history.

HARRINGTON SCORES NEW LIBERAL GOVT.

Wholesale Dismissal of Officials, Prevalence of Bootlegging and Extravagance Among Charges.

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, March 2.—Opposition fire was brought to bear today on the six months' record of Premier Angus L. Macdonald's Government as Opposition leader Gordon S. Harrington continued his scathing attack in Reply to the Speech from the Throne in the Nova Scotia Legislature.

The former Premier, head of the Conservative Government, which left office last August, spoke for three hours, directing a steady round of criticism towards the acts of the Liberal administration since its accession to power. At the close of the sitting he adjourned the debate until Monday.

He was critical particularly of what he termed "wholesale dismissals instituted by the new Government. More than 500 persons had been dismissed from the government service in the last six months, he said. "The worst exhibition ever given in the history of any province in Canada."

"The headman's axe was running blood from morning until night," the Opposition leader asserted, "bearing witness to the wholesale dismissal of responsible government. Charwomen had been dismissed because they did not 'vote right.' And he touched upon the dismissal of Superintendent of Nurses Ann Allen from the Nova Scotia Sanatorium at Kentville.

"Unjustified"

"It was impossible to justify this case," he declared. A gallant woman, with a splendid overseas record, had been discharged through an "uncharitable act. And he accused the Government of appointing a "pansy" commissioner to investigate her case after dismissal.

Hon. John A. McDonald, Minister of Agriculture, interrupted to remark that the nurse had been discharged for partnership. She had, he said, been a member of the Conservative party among members of the sanatorium staff. Nevertheless, Mr. Harrington asserted, her dismissal "certainly would not be justified in the judgment of the people of the province."

There had been in it, he said, 28 dismissals from the sanatorium staff. The government had made a "carnage" of reorganizing the staff. Two of the discharged employees, he said, had been replaced by convicted bootleggers. Other government positions had gone to liquor sellers.

"Bootleggers everywhere," he declared, "high and low; I went into the government office, and a convicted bootlegger took me up in the elevator."

The Liberal party, he said, had gained the support of the law-breakers by promising during last year's campaign to replace the Royal Canadian Mounted Police in Nova Scotia with a provincial force. "I think," he said, "that history will write that this government held office by virtue of the forces of disorder and disruption."

Brewery Connections

"We want to find out too," he said, "about the government's brewery connections." The Nova Scotia Liquor Commission was "buying beer from brewers in Saint John, in spite of the fact that it boosted Nova Scotia industry in its platform."

Turning to the economic enquiry promised by the government, the opposition leader expressed fear its purpose was "just complaint that we are suffering under Confederation." The trade investigation launched by the federal government was "wide enough to 'blow
