The casual has become a very versatile number, from the bootee type with offside flare and strap effects, cut-outs, high-riding versions, built-up vamps with open-up quarters, to the crepe soled

monk strapped flats in the 6-8 to 11-8 heel range. Most popular heel heights this fall will be in the 16-8 to 18-8, followed by 19-8 to 21-8, and the 12-8 to 15-8. However, with the wide variety of heel heights available practically every type of heel will be popular.

He was the soul of honesty and integrity in the business world in the community, in the Church, and especially in the home.
