**IN MEMORIAM**

**ARTHUR J. HARPER**

Friends in this city and throughout the province will regret to learn of the death of C. N. R. Conductor Arthur J. Harper, which occurred at his home, 205 Fitzroy Street, Sunday, after a long illness.

The deceased, who was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Harper, was born in Charlottetown, October 25th, 1877.

He served as an efficient member of the local police force for seven years, until he accepted the position of brakeman on the C. N. R. in November, 1905.

By strict attention to duty he received well earned promotions, acting as yard foreman and spare conductor from 1916 until his appointment as conductor in 1921.

The late Conductor Harper underwent an operation in May, 1930. He resumed work in September, but in January, 1931, was forced to go to Montreal for a second operation and after coming home was again compelled to return to Montreal the following June.

After this last operation he failed to improve, and on his return home kept to his bed, until his peaceful passing Sunday.

He was a member of the Masonic order and a faithful member of Trinity United Church.

Only two months ago his mother passed away; his wife predeceased him four years ago.

He leaves to mourn one son, Harold, and the following brothers and sisters: John M. Malden, Mass.; Geo. W. and Roland E., of this city; Mrs. Walter Overlan, Everett, Mass.; Mrs. J. A. Watkins, St. Louis, Mo.; Mrs. Arthur Henderson, Union and Mrs. Louise Harper, city to all of whom the Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy.

The sons are Victor, Harry, Albert, John and Lester in Georgetown, Oliver in Charlottetown, and William in Everett, Mass. The daughters are Mrs. James MacLeod, Halifax, Mrs. Herbert Fraser and Miss Jennie Rafuse, Charlottetown, Miss Marion Rafuse, Georgetown.

One brother, Anselm Rafuse, in Martin's Point, N.S., and two sisters Mrs. Walter Bennington, New York, and Mrs. Annie Hamm, survive.

All the children, with one exception were present at the funeral, which was held Sunday in Georgetown, and of which there was a large attendance of sympathizing friends. After services were conducted in the Baptist Church by Reverend Mr. P. Ke, the body was laid to rest in the Baptist Cemetery.

The pall bearers were Messrs. Chester Llewellyn, Daniel Martell, Dan Skinner, Robert Jeffrey, Ashley Allen and Peter Golell.

**MR. SCOBIE N. JOHNSON**

The death occurred at Georgetown on October 25th of Mr. Scobie N. Johnson, aged 79, a well known and highly respected resident. Mr. Johnson had been confined to his bed for four weeks, and during his last illness was tenderly nursed by his daughter, Mrs. Peter Ross, at whose home he passed away, and by his sister-in-law, Miss LePage.

Mr. Johnson was born in Long River, from there he removed to Cardigan, and about thirty years ago to Georgetown, where he has since resided. He was a carpenter by trade, and was engaged in that work for many years. He also held the position of bailiff for some time. For four and a half years he was jailer at Georgetown, and discharged the duties of that position faithfully and efficiently. In politics he was a strong Liberal. He was also a prominent member of the Orange order.

He leaves to mourn three daughters: Mrs. Peter Ross, Georgetown; Mrs. Edgar Webber, Chester, Mass.; Mrs. Charles Hartshorn of Lynn, Mass.

There was a large attendance at his funeral, which was held on Oct. 27th, Reverend C. E. Armstrong of Montague officiating, interment being in the Baptist Cemetery at Georgetown.
