OBITUARY.

Death under any circumstances is attended with pangs of sorrow in the part of the bereaved ones. The departed friends, it is, however, a sad and immutable, are difficult to bear more especially when it marks as victims those still in the prime of life. Such was the case in the death of Mrs. J. When in her youth, she became a member of Sumnerfield Presbyterian Church, and her daily life has always testified to the depth of her faith. Not only on the bed of sickness the light began to shine, but it had long burned with a clear and steady flame. Those who were most intimately acquainted with her, she leaves to share their irreparable loss three sisters—Mrs. Major Lowther, Searletown; Mary and Amy at home; also three brothers—John of Sumnerfield; Archie of Calgary, Alta.; and Norris and Peter at home.

On Monday a short service conducted by her pastor (Rev. R. G. Strathe) was held at her home, 120 Cumberland St., after which the remains, followed by a large concourse of people, were forwarded to Sumnerfield. The interment took place on the following day at two p. m. The service being led by her former pastor (Rev. John Murray) who very tenderly and touchingly referred to the beautiful life, consistent example and victorious death of the departed. After the solemn service the procession slowly marched to the cemetery, where, amid the tears of relatives and friends, and the silent compassion of an assemblage, comprising all denominations, the remains were laid to rest aside those of her sainted father, who had gone before.—Com.

PERFORMANCE AT DRURY LANE THEATRE

LONDON, May 18.—Drury Lane Theatre was transformed into a fairy bower with flower garlands and drooping foliage last night at the gale performance of Hubert Legton's old comedy, "Money," given in honor of the German Emperor by a star cast which left the principal roles in half the London theatres in the hands of understudies.

The King and Queen and their Imperial guests dined early at Buckingham Palace, and then drove in procession to the Theatre through crowds of cheering spectators. Drury Lane's dingy exterior was brightened with festoons of greenery and illuminated with the Royal and Imperial emblems. Inside, the house was a blaze of light and color. As soon as the were drawn aside revealing a drop curtain especially designed by the artist, John Seymour Lucas, representing equestrian portraits of King George and Emperor William in military uniforms, saluting allegorical figures of Britannia and Germania surrounded by a floating figure of Peace, bestowing laurels upon the two Sovereigns, and a distant view of St. Pauls and London. This drop scene had been kept a secret and when it was uncovered it was greeted with enthusiasm. The play was presented with great success.

The King and Emperor William personally complimented Squire Bancroft and Mr. Lucas, who had arranged the production, and expressed their heartiest thanks to all concerned and their admiration for the finest acting they had ever seen. In the club seen thirty actor-managers and leading actors appeared and in every act the play was marked by picturesqueness, the scenery and costumes having been so carefully considered that each scene was a veritable living picture of a by-gone period.

The long line of people waited for more than 24 hours at the entrance to secure admission to the unreserved seats. One of the interesting features of the performance was the singing of the Emperor's composition "Song to Aegle."

GIGANTIC CONSPIRACY TO FLEECE THE PUBLIC

EDUCATION ON LINES THAT ARE IMPERIAL

LONDON, May 18.—The official report of the Imperial Education Conference has been issued. The board of education desire it to be expressed to the overseas representatives concerned that the examinations in science and art in the dominions have not been completely abandoned. Warm views which the office of special inquiries and reports rendered and the board is asked to permit the continuance of the same with such extension as to meet the needs of the various education departments of the dominions.

The Morning Post says—If the conference is to become a true link between the educational authorities of every part of the empire, something more than an isolated meeting every year in required. Constant interchange of information and opinion must be arranged for. It spite of the lack of proper preparation on the part of the board of education, the conference results are encouraging and the future development of a common imperial tradition in education is made possible.

SAD BOATING ACCIDENT OUTSIDE SYDNEY HARBOR

SYDNEY, May 20.—Albert Harrington, chief steward of the Sydney Club, and R. Bond night foreman at the Electric Co's. car barns, were drowned while sailing of Sydney Harbor yesterday.

Particulars of the accident are meagre and the accident was only witnessed by a man on the shore of the creek. It is feared that the drowning accident claimed not only two but four victims. After the distressing news reached Sydney, efforts were made to communicate with Mrs. Harrington. All efforts to locate Mrs. Harrington failed and it is now said that instead of going out of town, she and a friend (Mrs. Hines) went out in a boat with two men.

IMPERIAL CONFERENCE WILL OPEN ON MONDAY

LONDON, May 20.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier is expected in London tonight with Sir Frederick Borden and Mr. Brodeur. Premier Botha, of South Africa, arrives tomorrow. Sir Joseph Ward, of New Zealand, Premier Fisher, of Australia, and Premier Morris of Newfoundland are already here.

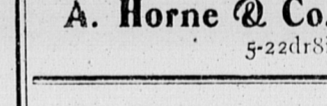

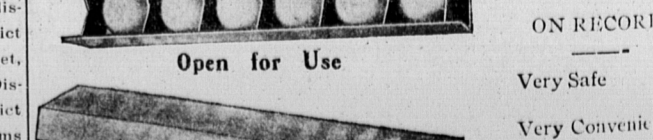
