THAT CAR OF YOURS

This is a series of articles pertaining to maintenance and repair of your Automobile. We will be glad to answer through this column, questions regarding your car or its mechanism.

THE CARE OF YOUR CAR

If your car was to stall on the road, there is a system if put into operation that will locate the trouble without any guess-work. The engine's functioning is dependent upon the following occurrences: Gasoline, spark oil, compression and timing.

In a gravity feed system, this can be located in the line between the tank and the carburetor, but where a vacuum system is used, it is quite likely to be in the air line between the manifold and the vacuum tank or the vacuum tank and the gas tank.

Question.—What type of generator is used on a car?—B. J. B. Cardigan.

Answer.—This type of generator is of the inherent regulation type and cannot be regulated to give a greater output than its own maximum.

See that the commutator is clean and free from grease and that the bushings are not allowing the armature to rub on the field.

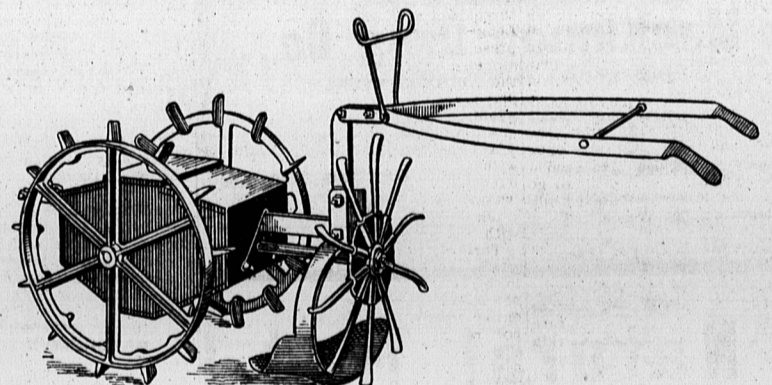
