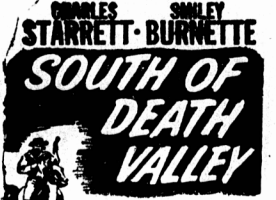

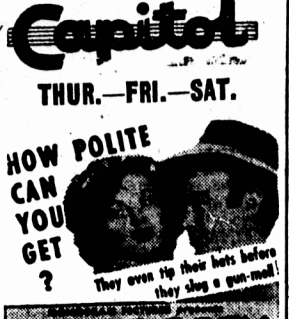

Death in Winnipeg Of Former Islander MALCOLM J. NICHOLSON

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Saturday in Mordus Bros. Funeral Home, Winnipeg, for Malcolm J. Nicholson, 75, who died as the result of a street car accident in Winnipeg on Tuesday. He resided with his nephew, Dr. Daniel Nicholson, 1246 Wolsley Ave. Mr. Nicholson was born in Montague, Prince Edward Island, in 1886. He started his long service with the Canadian Pacific Railway as bridge and building foreman and later inspector, with headquarters at North Bay, Ont. He retired in 1940. He is survived by his widow, the former Miss Grace McMillan, who is now an invalid in a nursing home in Toronto; a niece, Mrs. E. Chesness, San Diego, Calif.; a nephew, Dr. D. Nicholson, Winnipeg. Rev. George R. Service, of Augustine United Church, officiated at the services. Burial was in Brookside Cemetery. Pall-bearers were: Dr. F. A. Benner, Dr. A. M. Goodwin, Dr. Q. W. Hogg, Dr. Kenneth Johnson, Dr. M. R. MacCharles and Dr. W. F. Tisdale.

Tragic Incident At Georgetown

A tragic Halloween aftermath occurred at Georgetown, where the body of Mr. Alfred Clory was found about 6:30 yesterday morning in the yard of the town policeman, Wilfred MacQuillan, by a neighbour, Mr. J. E. Blackett. The deceased had left home about 1:30 a.m. to lodge a complaint with Mr. MacQuillan about the conduct of some Halloween pranksters, and he evidently succumbed to a heart attack before reaching the policeman's house. Mr. MacQuillan, at that time was on duty in another part of the town.

On discovery of the body the R.C.M.P. were notified and the coroner, Dr. George Inman, after investigation, decided that death was due to heart failure. The deceased had been treated for a heart condition on a previous occasion.

The body was lying in an unlighted part of the yard and was unnoticed by Mr. MacQuillan until his return home shortly after 2 a.m. yesterday.

The late Mr. Clory was a carpenter by trade, and was forty-seven years of age. He is survived by his wife and a large family, to whom the sincere sympathy of the community is extended.

- NEWSY NOTES -

THE SKY IN NOVEMBER, 1949 On Nov. 3, the Moon is in Apogee, distant from the Earth 252,300 miles. It is Full Moon on Nov. 25th. Hunter's Moon proverbially.

Conjunction of the Moon and the planet Uranus, Nov. 9, at 21 hrs. 18 min. Last Quarter of the Moon, Sunday, Nov. 13. Nov. 14, 19 hrs. 52 min., conjunction of the Moon and Mars. On Nov. 15, conjunction of the Moon and Saturn, (8.30 a.m.), on this date the famous Leonid Meteors should appear.

Moon in Perigee Nov. 18th; 223,400 miles away. New Moon, Nov. 20. Conjunctions: Moon and Venus, Nov. 23 (2.10 p.m.); and Moon and Jupiter Nov. 24, 7.35 a.m. The Biellid Meteors, Nov. 27; also same date the Moon is in its First Quarter.

The Leonid Meteors follow the track of the great comet of 1866, which has disintegrated, says the Astronomer Royal. This swarm of fragments takes about 3 years to pass any given point, but 333 years to go completely round its orbit. This means that the fragments of the comet are not uniformly spread round the orbit.

However, Humboldt whilst in South America, observed a heavy meteor shower on Nov. 13th, 1799. I have also a list of 10 other similar appearances at about the same season of the year, commencing with that of A.D. 902, and ending in 1898. The conclusion we are forced to accept is that the break-up of the comet of 1866 did not originate the displays, though it may have enhanced them.

THE AXILLA

This word was misprinted "oxilla" in a recent Note, which explained that it is the medical term for the armpit. There is not much difference in the script for "a" and "o", and in the stir of a busy newspaper office it is easy to make a slip. The marvel is that we have little to guide us from the fact that the feathers on a bird's body, under the wings, are called the axillars.

THE HISTORIAN TACITUS (I)

I have here an old volume, bound in calfskin, comprising the works of Caius Cornelius Tacitus, Roman historian, who probably lived (if we have little to guide us) from A.D. 55 to 120. An engraving from an antique bust shows a pleasant, intelligent countenance somewhat of the Grecian type, adorned with a curling beard, trimmed with a sword, and his head is covered thickly with curly locks. In bodily vigor a Roman but in artistic appreciation a Helene.

Tacitus writes the Annals which began with the death of the Emperor Augustus A.D. 14 and ended on the death of Nero in 68; then follows the Historiae, the history of his own times, from A.D. 68 to the death of Domitian in 96. Some chapters of both series have been lost, a catastrophe very frequent for old writings.

Dr. Wm. Smith of Classic fame, writes of this historian: "The marble trimmings of his style are vigorous, and his arguings with meaning. . . . As he grew older his style became more sombre, his love of rhetorical devices increased, . . . and his power of epigram is shown in the most striking fashion."

The period immortalized by Tacitus was a strange one. Augustus embellished the city of Rome with the most magnificent buildings, and it is rejected by the system when first used. I was obliged to make several attempts at smoking before I "got away with it". It was early discovered that the pressed leaf would not stand the voyage across the Atlantic without moulding, unless treated with some preservative "sauce", usually a preparation of saltpetre. The combination of leaf and sauce was pretty severe on the juvenile delinquent!

There were no cigarettes in those days, though there were "bows" all the feathers edged with red, resembling them in form, but the wrapping was not paper but leaf.
