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## Glace Bay Take Game In Series

GLACE BAY, N.S., Sept. 10.—(CP)—Defeating the Maritime champion Liverpool Larrupers by a 11-6 count, the Glace Bay Hoy Name team today won their first victory in three starts in the best-of-five series for the Nova Scotia senior baseball title. Liverpool took the two openers played in the mainland town.

Next game will be played here tomorrow.

Dr. Roy Maxwell, who came out of a three-year retirement to pitch Glace Bay into the provincial finals a few days ago, again turned the trick for the mulling town team. The smooth-working physician lacked his usual control but managed to hold Liverpool scoreless and with only two hits until the seventh inning.

His teammates, meanwhile, had showed unexpected batting punch against port-sided Jim Mont and when Larrupers sent their first run across, they were lagging on the short end of a 10-0 score. Glace Bay scored two in the third, another pair in the sixth and six in the sixth. Jim Batten's eighth inning homer rounded out their scoring.

Larrupers marked up three in the seventh and another three in the ninth. One was a homer by Vic Winters in the last inning.

Umpire Herb Dickson announced Liverpool played the game under protest, claiming it was not started at the proper time.

## Senators Take 5-2 Victory From White Sox

NEW YORK, Sept. 10.—(AP)—Washington Senators combined a triple play, an extra base hit at bat and Ken Chase's six-hit pitching for a 5-2 victory over the White Sox at Chicago today in the first of a two-game American League series.

The triple play, second in the league this season, came after Taft Wright, pitcher, and Mike Tresh singled. Bob Kennedy lined to Jim Bloodworth who tossed to Sherry Robertson to catch Wright. Robertson then threw to Jack Sanford, catching Tresh off first.

At Detroit, Robert Moses Grove, the aging but still potent Tiger-tamer, went the route for Boston Red Sox in a 13-inning baseball thriller to drop the Tigers into second place in the torrid American League race.

Tom Carey's single off relief pitcher Alton Benton scored Joe Cronin from second base with the winning run to give Boston a 6-5 decision and Grove his seventh victory of the season.

Detroit's defeat restored the idle Cleveland Indians, raised out of their game with New York Yankees to the league leadership, with a 5714-to-5704 margin over the Tigers. The Yankees are only two points back of Detroit, at 568.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 10.—(CP)—It took a girl's substitute steel, streamlining, air-conditioning and functional furniture for the traditional "wooden gingerbread" of Mississippi River steamboats.

Riding the river daily on excursions from St. Louis is a new giant, the \$1,000,000 S.S. Admiral, largest inland steamer ever built in America, as modern as a streamlined airplane and as modernistic as a cocktail lounge.

## Leading 64 Go Into Match Play

MAMARONECK, N.Y., Sept. 10.—(AP)—Practice in private paid off today as Dick Chapman won the medal in the 36-hole qualifying round of the 44th United States Amateur Golf Championship with a four-under-par of 140.

Leading 64 players into match play which starts tomorrow with two 18-hole rounds, Chapman played under par, to capture top honors by a five-stroke margin.

Last month, before the sectional eliminations, Chapman decided his game had gone sour. To turn it back again, he began playing with Frank Strazza, a little-known young professional in Greenwich.

Chapman cut two strokes from his first-round performance, and was two shots better than anyone else for the day.

One of the 71 shooters was W.B. (Duff) McCullough, Jr., Philadelphia. His fine round of 36, 35 tied him for runner up honors with defending champion Marvin (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash., who shot a 73.

At 1146 were George Dawson of Chicago, 72-74; Maurice McCarthy, Jr., Cincinnati, 70-70; Tom Whiteway, Cleveland, 71-75; and Harold Mandly, Jr., Avon, Conn., a pair of 73's. The other 71 men, former public link champion Frank Strazza, was in the next bracket at 147 with Fred Hass, Jr., former Walker Cup performer from New Orleans, and one Canadian Amateur champion, Steve Kovach of Natona Heights, Pa.

Of the leading scorers only two others were lower today than on Monday. Hank Kowal of Indianapolis, matched par with a 72 to join four others at 148, and Johnny Fischer, 1936 champion from Cincinnati, also had a 72 for 149, where he finished even with southern champion Neil White and metropolitan champion Johnny Burke.

## Air Raid Stops Game At Lord's

LONDON, Sept. 10.—(CP)—Even in wartime it takes a lot to upset a cricket match in England.

Probably for the first time in history an air-raid stopped play at Lord's cricket ground in London. The Times tells it:

"As the umpires and the teams left the field at the sound of the siren, many spectators remained in their seats; others took cover beneath the stands, and a few went to public shelters in the neighborhood.

"But one spectator remained calm and unperturbed—a Chelsea pensioner who stood alone in the middle of the arena, a vivid figure in his red coat—satisfying himself apparently that the wicket would not crumble before it became the turn of the Scots Guards to bat."

Spectators at a Tottenham Hotspur football club practice match made up their mind they did not want play interfered with and their cheering drowned the wail of the siren.

Play continued for several minutes until police approached the referee and asked him to suspend the game. Their action was greeted with booms.

A cricket match in another district went on until the raider was sent overhead. Then the match was delayed for only a few minutes while the plane passed over. Some of the players stood under trees, others went to the pavilion.

The Bucs belted the offerings of Doc Prothro's hurlers for 22 runs, winning the first game 11-3 and the second 11-1.

Ben Warren of the Phils was knocked unconscious by Truett Sewell's fast ball while batting in the fourth inning of the afternoon game. He was taken to a hospital for treatment of a severe concussion.
