LONDON, June 13—(CP)—To arrange everything from religious meetings to provision of boxing gloves is the job of Col. Cameron Edwards over his new post in London. Col. Edwards, in charge of auxiliary services of the Canadian Active Service Force, speaks lightly of the task confronting him, but a glimpse through his records gives an indication of the various problems that accompany arrangements for entertaining an army.

For instance, the troops may have run out of anything from edible tennis balls to text books for student soldiers. So Col. Edwards passes on the word to the

Knights of Columbus or the Canadian Legion, which do the rest.

Into the thousands run the number of pieces of sports equipment donated by these various organizations. More than 90,000 is the combined attendance in shows arranged through the auxiliary branch under Capt. Mert Pluckett. Moving pictures have drawn 70,000. Hospitality in homes has been arranged for numerous Canadian soldiers and all sorts of accommodations have been arranged at London social and recreational clubs.

Washed-up Big League Players Stage Come-back

CHICAGO, June 13—(AP)—Burgess Whitehead and Richard Bartell, two big league infielders dated as "washed up" a year ago, are in the blue chips again. Whitehead is playing third base for New York Giants as if he had never played anywhere else. Bartell is giving Detroit the finest shortstopping in the American League. It is no coincidence that the Tigers and Giants, both rated as long-shot pennant contenders, are near the top of their respective circuits. Neither team was given serious consideration in pre-season ranking because of wobbly infields.

Bartell, a victim of ankle trouble, made 36 errors in 191 games at short for the Cubs and finally was benched in favor of a young rookie. It looked as if he was through. This season he has played in every one of Detroit's 45 games, has erred only three times and once only in his last 31 games. Bartell is hitting only .234, but connects with men on the bases and serves as a poetry sparking for the Tiger machine.

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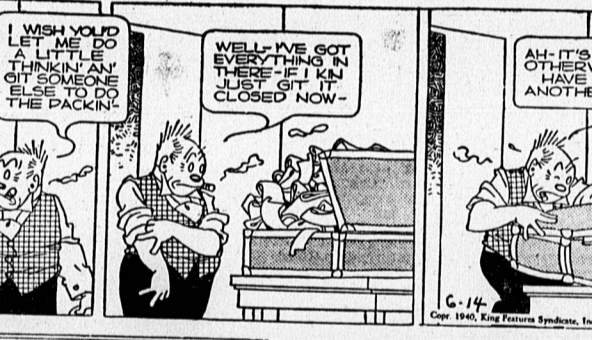
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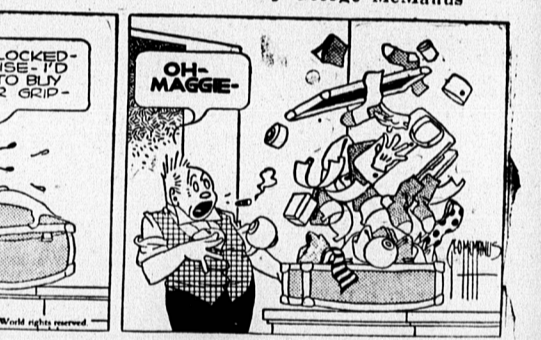

Mighty U. S. Battleship Is Launched

NEW YORK, June 13—(AP)—A battleship destined to be one of the mightiest units in the United States' first line of defense, christened down the launching ways into the East River today.

It was christened the U. S. S. North Carolina and was proclaimed by the governor of that state and the secretary of the navy as a symbol of the stepped-up defence program.

"It speaks a language that even a dictator can understand," said Governor Clyde R. Hoey. Said Navy secretary Charles Edison, "we tried sincerely but in vain to halt world rearmament. We build now, not to aggress, but to be too strong to be aggressed."

The North Carolina, 35,000 tons and 750 feet long, is a sister ship of the Washington, launched at Philadelphia June 11.

CZECHS TO FRONT

TOURS, France, June 12—(CP) Havana) —Aviators and first units of the Czechoslovak army, reconstituted in France, are now joining the French and British at the front, the Czechoslovak national committee announced in a telegram addressed to Premier Reynaud and Prime Minister Churchill tonight.

"They came low. Just over trees and hills. You would know they were coming until they were there." One old car looked as if the woman driver were the only occupant until it stopped. Then a boy came from the other side sucking a sore finger. He had to lie down on the fender and hold down the choke so the car could go.

Most cars have mattresses strapped on the top and people explain: "They say it will keep off machine gun bullets." Nearly all have bicycles tied on sides of roofs. On a 200-mile stretch of the main refugee route, there are lines of people 100 yards or so long at every filling station that has gasoline left. When the cars run dry, people push them off the road, unstrap bicycles and pedal on.

Now and then an elderly bearded man wearing a beret and a row of old medals and carrying a sporting rifle stops the cars and looks at identification papers. He is a local defence volunteer on the lookout for parachutists and fifth columnists.

Refugees Seek Food, Gasoline; Disregard Signs

SOMEWHERE IN FRANCE, June 13—(AP)—Thousands of tired people of Paris, streaming through an unnamed French town in search of safety in the south, don't believe in signs.

Every two or three minutes an automobile stops and a woman gets out and knocks on the closed door of a restaurant under a big card that says "no more food." "Nobody answers and the car goes on.

They do the same at the hotel that says "no rooms" and a filling station that says "no gasoline." The square of this town was jammed with people hoping in vain that the restaurant and filling station would open. The crowd began to thin down in mid-afternoon, and in the afternoon the square was almost empty, but cars still passed at the rate of two or three every minute.

There are big limousines marked "Corps Diplomatique" with luncheon baskets and glistening luggage on the roofs, rickety trucks piled with ploughs, harrows, and crates of chickens, and taxis that used to carry tourists to Montmartre. Just after noon a Paris bus with mothers, nurses and babies went by. It was a maternity hospital taking refugees outside the threatened city. Later an ambulance full of children stopped to get drinking water.
