CHARLOTTETOWN LADY MARRIED ABROAD

BRIDGEPORT, Conn., Nov. 25.—Capt. Alvin Strickland Hunt and Mrs. McNeill, widow of the late Charles H. McNeill, were united in marriage at the home of Henry F. and Mrs. Veit by the Rev. E. J. Crafts, pastor of the Christ Episcopal church, Nov. 18 at 8 o'clock. They were attended by Mr. and Mrs. Veit, and the only guests present were very intimate friends, including host's family. After a supper the happy pair departed for New York, en route to Florida, where they will spend their honeymoon at Palm Beach.

The bride is the widow of a brother of Hon. Archibald McNeill, and her husband was one of the assessors until ill health compelled him to resign. She is very handsome and has charming manners. She wore a tailor made gown of taupe broadcloth. After their return from their wedding trip they will reside at the Stratfield.

Capt. Alvin S. Hunt, the groom, was said to be the most confirmed bachelor in the city. He is a veteran of the civil war, having been a member of Co. A, 21st Conn. Vol., and after he was mustered out of the service settled in this city. He has always been a prominent member of the Grand Army of the Republic, and is better known from his long police record, being the second officer in command of the department, and one of its oldest members. He joined the force as a patrolman in February, 1881, nearly twenty-eight years ago. He was appointed sergeant in June, 1892, and a lieutenant two years later. He was appointed captain in April, 1895. His official and private life has been marked by a quiet attention to business. He is not demonstrative, but reticent. POLICE OFFICER UP FOR THEFT

Kenora Sergt. Caught Taking Money from Prisoner Whom He Thought Was Drunk.

KENORA, November 25.—Recently Police Sgt. John Russell, of the local police force, was arrested on a charge of theft. Russell was caught and pleaded guilty to stealing eleven dollars from Charles Wiggins, a prisoner whom he had arrested for being drunk. Having had their suspicions aroused some time ago, the police authorities placed a couple of detectives on to Russell. One of these went under the name of Charles Wiggins and feigned drunkenness. He was arrested by Russell and the latter while searching his prisoner preparatory to putting him in a cell found sixteen dollars on him. Of this sum he abstracted eleven dollars and credited the prisoner up with the remainder.

SCORES CANADA FOR ITS TREATMENT OF EAST INDIANS.

MONTREAL, Nov. 25.—A special London cable says: Referring to the Sikh immigrant in British Columbia the London Globe says that so far from treating him as a subject of the same empire the Canadian often ignorant enough to treat the Sikh Hindu as a "nigger." The Canadian, the Globe says, is putting a hard strain on imperialism when he begins to treat the Indian as a man utterly beneath himself, while he still asks that the Indian civil service should be open to himself and his sons, and that the Indian trade should be free to Canadians.
