Montreal, July 16 - The appointment of H. C. Grayston to be chief of car service, Canadian National Railways, with headquarters at Montreal, effective today, is announced by S. P. Ding, chief of transportation of the company. Mr. Grayston was formerly general supervisor of car service, and he now succeeds W. A. Kirkpatrick who is retiring after nearly a half century of railway service.

Egg And Poultry Market Stronger

The market for both eggs and poultry has strengthened during the past week and paying prices have increased, reports Mr. F. M. Nash, senior poultry products inspector. Prides on live fowl increased 1 1/2 cents per lb and eggs one cent per dozen. Egg production on P. E. I. is steadily decreasing. Operators of grading stations report receipts down ten percent from past week. Quality remains good for the season and due to increased demand for eggs throughout the Maritimes all Grade A eggs are being shipped to other Maritime points. It is expected that production from this date will decrease rapidly causing higher prices for the product. Poultrymen having laying flocks are advised to retain their birds until production drops below economical levels before marketing their birds as live poultry. Due to the increase in prices, operators of grading stations are now quoting producers for ungraded eggs AL 48 1-2, AM 41 1-2, B 33, C 18-22. Wholesalers are quoting grading station operators for a Large 48 1-2, A Medium 46 1-2, B 38 and jobbing to retailers at AL cartoned 53, A medium 51, B 40. Eggs are retailing in Charlottetown for the cartoned Grade A Large pack 59, A Medium 57 and Grade B loose 47.

Poultry Market Brief

The poultry market especially on live fowl is very lively. The American demand for the product is strong. Producers in the Delmarva area are receiving for No. 1 fowl live 35 1-2 cents per lb. American buyers are sending trucks to P. E. I. and offering truck load assemblies at least 27 cents per lb. for healthy fowl less birds with crook, one breast or blisters, weighing five pounds and over. The duty and cost of transporting birds to the U. S. A. is borne by the Americans.

Dealers generally in the Province last week paid 24 1-2-25 cents a lb for all live poultry weighing five pounds and over, delivered to trucks or assembly points. Where fowl had to be picked up at farms a charge of approximately one cent per lb. was levied for this service. Anyone having live fowl five pounds and over should have no difficulty receiving 24 1-2 cents per lb.

There is a good demand for chicken in the United States but unfortunately our chickens are not sufficiently developed at this time to meet the requirements of the American market. Chickens should not be offered for sale until they weigh five pounds live. Last week American markets paid the producer 30 cents a lb. for live chickens five pounds and over.

Some Charlottetown dealers are quoting for poultry as follows: Fowl no 1, five pounds and over 26 cents per lb; Fowl no 1, under five pounds 22 cents per lb; Fowl no. 1 fowl are fairly well fleshed birds. The writer is informed that practically all birds up to weight not having crooked breast bones or blisters or being extremely piny fall into this grade.

No. 2 grade are thin birds lacking flesh on breast and birds with crooked breast bones, blisters, or extremely piny birds. As the vice indicates, this bird is not desired. Quotations on chicken as follows: MFA 32, Grade B 26, C 15.

Supplements For Swine

(Experimental Farms News)

Three types of supplements, protein, mineral and vitamin, are commonly required for the maintenance of health, vigor, normal growth and efficient gains of swine. The kind and amount of each type of supplement needed will depend upon such things as the season of year, conditions under which the pigs are kept, age and basic feeds supplied, says W. W. Cram, Dominion Experimental Farm, Indian Head, Sask.

Suitable protein supplements for swine include skim milk, buttermilk, tankage and fish meal. Lined oil meal and alfalfa meal are also useful when included in protein or protein-mineral mixtures which contain at least 30 per cent of tankage or fish meal.

When one or two pounds of skim milk per pound of grain is fed to pregnant or nursing sows, and 2 or 2 1/2 pounds for weaning pigs, and this proportion gradually reduced to one pound per pound of grain for finishing market pigs, no other protein supplements should be necessary. The milk products, preferably red sweet, are best for nursing and weaning pigs and should be used if possible. In the absence of milk in either form, tankage or a good mixed protein supplement should be fed at the rate of 4 to 5 per cent of the grain mixture for pregnant and nursing sows; 8 to 10 per cent for weaning pigs, gradually decreasing the amount to 3 or 4 per cent for the finishing period.

Minerals which may be deficient in ordinary rations are common salt, lime and iodine. All pigs should be given salt at the rate of one-half to one pound per 100 pounds of grain eaten. If ample amounts of milk or tankage are not fed, one-half to one per cent of ground limestone should be added to the meal mixture for pigs of all ages. To ensure live, normal litters at birth, each sow during pregnancy should receive a tablespoonful two or three times weekly of a supplement to prevent anemia. As much iron sulphate as will cover a dime or half this amount of reduced iron placed on the tongue of each piglet on the 3rd, 11th and 21st days after birth is effective in the prevention of anemia. Fresh earth or sods supplied to the young pigs during the nursing period is also effective against this disease. Sprinkling the sods with a solution of one tablespoonful of iron sulphate to a quart of water improves their effectiveness.

During winter months or when pigs are quartered without much sunlight or green forage, they are likely to suffer from a vitamin deficiency. Good green alfalfa or other hay, or alfalfa meal, are valuable sources of the vitamins likely to be lacking. Feeding from a teaspoonful to a tablespoonful, depending upon the size of pig, of one of the fish oils will greatly improve the health and thrift of growing pigs and breeding stock under such conditions.
