S.; George, Boston, and Russel at Brookfield, P. E. I., besides a large number of relatives and friends.

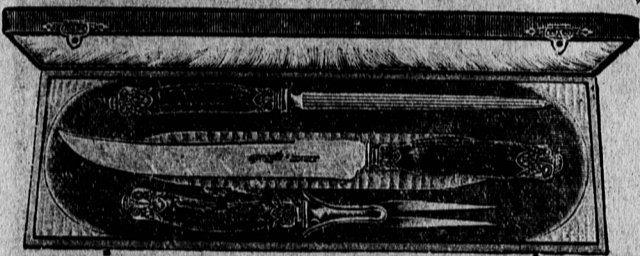
