WINNIPEG, July 17—(CP)—Winnipeg grain exchange completed another dormant session today, with wheat futures prices resting at their fixed minimums of 71 3-8 cents per bushel for July wheat, 73 5-8 for October, and 74 5-8 for December.

### FINANCE

NEW YORK, July 17—(AP)—Buying was concentrated in a few stocks today while the market sluggishly tried to get out of its summer rut.

Select issues in the Canadian section showed fractional gains. Dome, Walkers, Brazilian Locomotive and Lake Shore finished fractions higher while Imperial Tobacco lost 1-4. In the bond market Canada 4s were unquoted.

A number of shares moved up a point or more, including J. I. Case, Union Carbide, U. S. Gypsum, John-Manville, and Caterpillar-Tractor.

The Associated Press composite price of 60 stocks was unchanged at 41.7. With dealings slackening as the rally eased, transactions declined to 381,920 shares compared with 437,840 yesterday.

Closing off fractions to more than a point were United States Steel, Bethlehem, Westinghouse, United Aircraft, Douglas, Loft, Du Pont, Anaconda, Chrysler, Standard Oil of New Jersey and New York Central.

### C.N.R. Operating Revenues Increase

MONTREAL, Que., July 17—An increase in operating revenues of \$7,170,416 and an increase in net revenue of \$5,573,302 for the month of June this year is shown in the monthly statement of operating revenues. Operating expenses and net revenue of the Canadian National Railways all-inclusive system issued at headquarters today the first six months of the current year show an increase in operating revenues of \$26,000,021 and an improvement in net revenue of \$18,607,830.

Operating revenues for the corresponding period of 1939, operating revenues in June of this year were \$22,359,937 and operating expenses \$16,786,731 leaving a net revenue of \$5,573,302.

Operating revenues from January 1 to June 30, 1940, were \$113,681,551 and operating expenses \$97,481,468 resulting in a net revenue of \$16,200,083. The summaries follow:

CHICAGO, July 16—(CP)—Counsel for the Western Union Telegraph Company and four co-defendants today asked the quashing and dismissal of a federal indictment charging the Western Union and 11 others with operating a lottery by transmitting horse racing information over interstate circuits.

Replying to the government's charge, Attorney Owen West, representing Western Union, declared in a demurrer, which he filed in federal court, that the company was merely furnishing service to its patrons and was not guilty of wrongdoing even though a patron might be using that service for an illegal purpose.

He denied that the Western Union was in any sense a conspirator.

### Modern Million Dollar Hospital Handed To Army

LONDON July 17—(CP Cable)—The modern \$1,000,000 Canadian Red Cross hospital built by contributions of the people of the Dominion was handed over to the Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps at a formal ceremony today.

In the quiet Buckinghamshire countryside where it is situated, the splendidly equipped hospital was presented by Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett to Hon. Vincent Massey, Canadian High Commissioner, who accepted it on behalf of the Canadian Government. It was immediately turned over to Col. R. M. Luton, Director General of Canadian Medical Services.

Now it is ready for its work of mercy and healing. The ward already has a handful of patients—boys of the R. C. A. M. C. unit which is staffing the hospital. They are suffering from flu to colds.

Col. Luton, Arthur of Winnipeg is in command of the unit and the Matron in charge of the nursing sisters is Miss J. Macrair of Winnipeg.

Col. Gen. A.G.L. McNaughton, the Canadian Commander, Sir Edward Peacock, Canadian-born director of the Bank of England, and Viscount and Viscountess Astor, for whose estate the hospital has been built, were among the notables attending the presentation ceremony held beneath the porch of the main entrance to the big brick and steel structure.

Fifty comely Canadian nurses, wearing attractive blue and white uniforms were lined up on both sides of the entrance, with a detachment of the R.C.A.M.C. beyond.

Col. George Nasmith was chairman while Capt. J. C. Egan, Sheraton, Man. Padre of the unit, offered a prayer of blessing for the hospital.

Mr. Bennett thanked two anonymous donors who contributed the estimated cost of the originally-planned 300-bed hospital (the present one can hold as many as 750 men) and another who contributed the approximate cost of the equipment.

### ELLIOTVALE SCHOOL CLOSING

The closing examination of Elliotvale School held in the newly decorated schoolroom, was well attended by parent ratepayers, who were highly pleased with the progress made during the year.

### Up To Car Dealers To Protect Themselves Says Finance Minister

OTTAWA, July 16—(CP)—Imposition of a tax on automobiles was anticipated by the industry before the budget was brought down and if dealers did not protect themselves under their contracts they have themselves to blame to a certain extent, Finance Minister Isley declared in the House of Commons yesterday.

His comment came during consideration of the budget resolution on automobile taxation when opposition members were urging special consideration in the case of cars in process of distribution at the time the budget was brought down, June 24.

"Perhaps I am going a little too far in making that statement," the Minister added, "but certainly a tax on automobiles was no surprise to the people in the automobile business."

"Nothing was discussed more than the probability that when the budget came down heavy taxes would be imposed on cars and everyone who was in the business conducted his operations with that possibility in the back of his mind."

### LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, July 17—(CP)—There were 11 cattle, 81 sheep and 210 hogs and 122 calves for sale on Montreal livestock markets today.

All classes of livestock were unchanged.

There were only 11 cattle and these were common quality cows selling between \$2.75 to \$4.00.

Calves were \$4.50 for very common grass calves to \$8.50 for the best. The bulk of the sales were made between \$5 and \$6.50.

Good ewes and wethers were \$1 and \$2 per hundredweight respectively. Sheep were \$3 to \$4.

Hogs were firm at \$9 for bacon, fed and watered and up to \$9.25 for trucks. Selects drew \$1 per hog premium with the regular cuts at off grades. Cows were \$4.75 to \$5.50. Hogs sold on rail grade brought \$12 flat weight.

On Maritime markets, rail grade hogs \$11.70. Sows no 1 up to 270 pounds \$6.25 flat, over 270 pounds \$5.25. 2 undesirable all weights \$4.25 flat.

Choice steers \$8.50, good \$8, medium \$7.25, fair \$6.25, common \$4 to \$5.25. Choice heifers \$8, good \$7.50, medium \$6.75, fair \$6, common \$4 to \$5. Choice sows \$5.50, good \$4.75, fair \$4.25, canners \$2 to \$3. Boring bulls \$3 to \$4, butcher hogs \$4.50 to \$5.25.

\$3 to 4. Choice lambs \$8.50 to \$10.50.

### Health Values of Canadian Foods

The subject of health values of Canadian foods, particularly fruits and vegetables, is receiving an increasing amount of attention and national problems of chemical substances, said Dr. J. M. Strain, Director, Science Department, Dominion Department of Agriculture, in a recent address on "Technical Agriculture in War Time." Discoveries made in the last few years have shown that the buoyant health of human beings, and also of domestic animals, depends in part on the consumption of small amounts of chemical substances called vitamins, whose importance until recently was almost completely unknown.

Canadian fruits and vegetables contain certain of the vitamins in sufficient amount if the products are wisely selected and properly prepared for the table. Research is continually bringing to light new facts about these health substances, but more is required to be known before Canadian home-grown products can be utilized to the fullest advantage. It may be said that several Canadian laboratories are working on these problems at the present time, and if the program that has been planned can be carried through to completion, a great deal more information on the health values of Canadian fruits and vegetables should be available before this year is over. There can be little doubt that the subject well deserves the attention of technical agriculture.
