Police Arrest Man After Early Morning Chase

INTERESTING EXHIBIT OF WATER COLORS

Maritime Artists Feature In Exhibition At Harris Memorial Art Gallery.

A very interesting exhibition of water colors and pastels is being held in the Harris Memorial Art Gallery by the Art Society of Prince Edward Island. It was collected and loaned by the Maritime Art Association. The collection is of special interest as it illustrates the modern trend of splash and quick drawing in water colors as opposed to the old fashioned method of careful drawing and composition and painstaking coloring. The pictures are well worth a visit to the gallery to see, as they illustrate vividly what is being done by Maritime artists. Among the works singled out for special praise by local artists was the pastel portrait by Miss C. McKel of Sackville. Only one picture by a Prince Edward Island artist appears, that of 'Pownall Bay,' a water color by Mrs. P. A. Creelman. Other artists are Miss Violet Lett of Saint John, whose water color 'Barbara, Bob and David,' drew much favorable comment, and Miss Pearl Woods, also of Saint John, who has a fine decorative panel in wood. In addition there are the water colors, 'Unloading' by LeRoy Zwicker, Halifax; 'The Mill' by Mrs. Ruth Salter Wainwright, Halifax; and 'The Mill on the Gasperaux' by Miss Gwendolyn Hales of Wolfville. All the above pictures are especially good in their respective lines, but there are many others, of which space will not permit mention, which are well worth a visit to the gallery. The exhibition will be open to the public this afternoon and tonight and tomorrow afternoon.

Young Marathoner Causes Sensation

MEDFORD, Mass., March 23—(AP)—Little Johnny Kelley, unemployed Arlington florist, stamped himself as the marathoner to beat in next month's famous Boston A. A. Distance race when he gained his fourth consecutive Medford Club 20-mile race victory yesterday in the record smashing time of one hour 52 minutes 59.2-5 seconds. He led a pack of 61 without a single challenge from the 13-mile mark and when he broke the tape he improved his own record for this, which he made in 1935 five weeks before he gained his Boston marathon victory, by two minutes, 27.3-5 seconds.

Walter Young Montreal clocked in 1:55:45 4-5, crossed the line second a half-mile behind the victor and the third finisher, Frank 'Pat' Dengis, the Baltimore marathon star, trailed the runner-up by about a mile. Clarence Demar, 49-year-old Keene, N. H., veteran, who has won seven Boston marathons, finished eighth.

Selassie Appeals For Massacre Probe

LONDON, March 22—(AP)—Haile Selassie has appealed to the League of Nations to investigate a 'massacre' at Addis Ababa, Foreign Secretary Eden told the House of Commons today after the Ethiopian legation reported three sons of prominent natives had been killed. Two sons of Dr. W. C. Martin, Ethiopian minister to London, and Fekade Selassie Herouy, son of Gueta Herouy, Ethiopian foreign minister under the Negus, were slain, the legation said.

To Establish Trans-Canada Air Service

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 22—First legislative steps to initiate a 'first class' coast-to-coast aviation service in Canada were taken tonight in the House of Commons. Transport Minister Howe moved the following resolution: 'That it is expedient to introduce a measure to incorporate a corporation to be known as Trans-Canada Air Lines with authority to establish and operate air lines and services across Canada and matters incidental thereto, also to authorize the government to enter into a contract with the corporation providing for the organization and operation of such lines and services including the transport of passengers, goods and mails, and for the payment of a subsidy to the corporation and for the operation and maintenance by the government of emergency landing fields and other specified services, and also to authorize the government at its discretion to acquire and pay for all of the shares of the capital stock of the corporation, and further to authorize the board of railway commissioners to fix the rates to be paid to the corporation for its services.'

Free State Plans Widows Pension

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) DUBLIN, March 22—Pensions for all widows in the Free State is the aim of a new widows' orphans' amendment bill now before the Dail. Sean T. O'Kelly minister for local government and public health who is sponsoring the measure, estimates that the number of widows to benefit under the new and more generous terms will be 41,500 as well as 29,000 children, including orphans. Under the old act, passed two years ago, 14,000 widows and 14,000 orphans received pensions. The cost to the Irish taxpayer goes up from \$1,000,000 to \$1,800,000 for the first year.

Urge Higher Duty On Furniture

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 22—The Tariff Board in a report tabled by Finance Minister Dunning in the Commons today recommended that the duty on furniture coming in from United States and other countries under special tariff be increased from 30 per cent to 37-1-2 per cent. As a 10 per cent trade agreement between France and applies to United States, the actual duty if the Board's recommendation was followed would be increased from 27 per cent to 33-3-4 per cent. It would mean that the rates for tariff item 519 covering various types of furniture should remain 15 per cent under the British preference to which it was reduced from 20 per cent in the budget now before the House. The intermediate duty would be increased from 30 to 37-1-2 per cent and the general remain at 45 per cent. The board proposed the advance be temporary, subject to review in two years and in the meantime the industry should investigate its problems and seek to remedy them.

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, March 22—Proposed organization of a 'central management committee' of the newly-formed Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities was announced today by Mayor E. J. Cragg of Halifax, president of the Federation. Purpose of the contemplated new unit, the President said, would be to deal with matters needing swift action, without the lengthy process of calling together the Federation's full executive. Its recommendations, though, would be subject to the national executive's approval. The committee would assist in the operation of the Federation's central office in Montreal. Mayor Cragg said: 'The close contact of such prominent municipal leaders in the administration of the office is particularly desirable.' The Halifax chief magistrate asserted.
