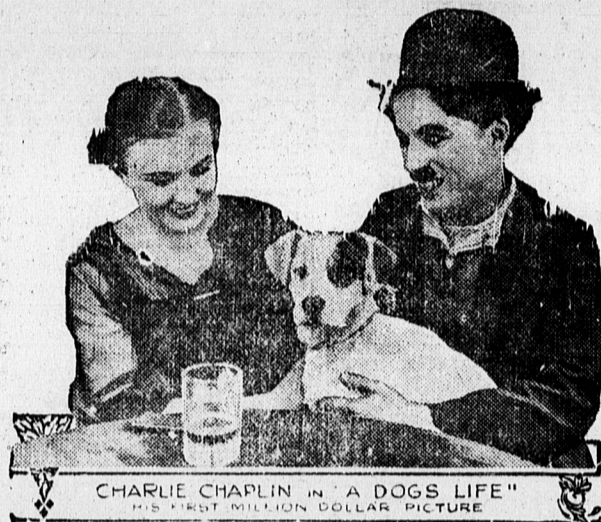

The death took place at the Falco-wood Hospital on Monday, Dec. 2nd, of Laurent A. Arsenaull of Abram's Village, at the age of 64. By his first wife a family of four daughters survive him, also he has the following brothers, Francis, Denis, Phyllis of Urbenville and Raphael away in the States, also two sisters, Mrs. Arcade Arsenaull of Abram's
