CAPE TORMENTINE-Cape Tormentine, terminus of the N. B. & P. E. I. railways, and one of the nearest points of communication between the Island and the mainland, being only nine miles apart, and used as a winter port for communication between the two places, during the fiscal year 1912-13 had \$5,232.51 expended on it for improvements and construction work. The amount of work was as follows: The face timbers on the breakwater pier, which had become damaged, were renewed; the hardwood sheathing was replaced along 14 feet of the pierhead, and four breaks in the covering were repaired; the window and doors of the freight sheds and the landing stage were repaired and a platform was built for transporting freight from the cars to the shed; 101 car-loads of large stone blocks were along the outside of the pierhead and along the outside of the approach for the extension of the stone slopes, and along the inner side of the approach.
