C., where I will arrive three or four days after leaving Skagway—about 1100 miles. We are now having snow and ice, but this fall has been a mild one. The miners have done fairly well around Atlin, the place I have run to since 1899 and since 1900 on this steamer, the 'Gleaner.' We have quartz here that runs as high as \$1000 to \$2000 to the ton of ore. Quartz mining is not fully developed around here yet, but when it is this will be a rich mining camp." Capt. Richards has friends and relatives in this Province who, no doubt, will be interested in the above.

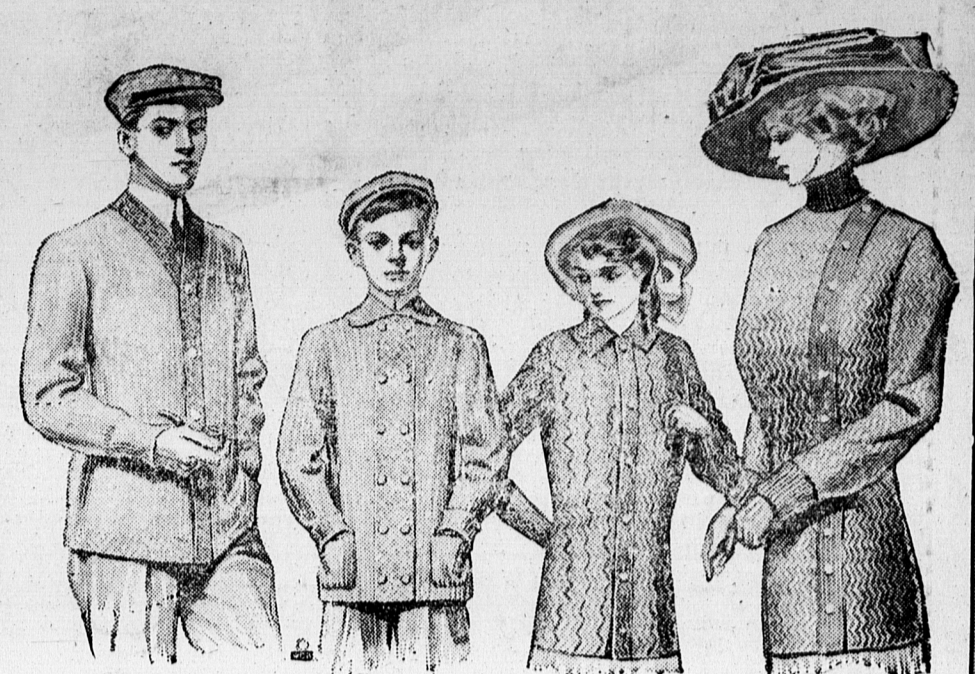
