EGGS
 OTTAWA, Ont., Aug. 26.—No change is reported from Canadian markets today but the general situation remains firm.
 Toronto: The local egg market is unchanged. Dealers are offering for ungraded cases returned, extras 37 to 39; firsts 33 to 35; seconds 25 to 26.
 MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 26.—The demand for all qualities of eggs is unchanged. The movement of new crop winter wheat flour was also steady and prices ruled steady. The United States demand for mill-feed continued good and a moderate amount of business done. The domestic trade was fair and the un-dertone firm. Standard grades of rolled oats were quiet and firm. An active business was transacted in all grades of eggs and values were steady. The receipts Saturday were 963 cases. Prices for all qualities of butter were firmly maintained under a good demand. The receipts were 5,408 packages. A feature of the cheese trade was the strength that developed for Western grades and values were marked up 1-4 to 3-8 cents per pound. The receipts were 12,822 boxes.
