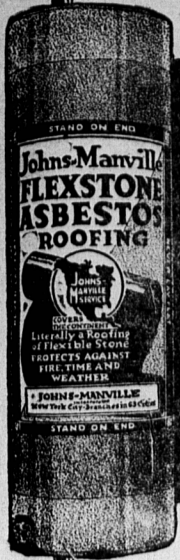

IN MEMORIAM

GEORGE C. CLARK

In the early morning hours of Wednesday, May 24, 1933, there passed peacefully to the eternal rest the spirit of George C. Clark, North Wiltshire, in his 72nd year. About two months previous to his death he suffered a slight stroke of paralysis from which he recovered sufficiently to be up around, but on Monday, May 22nd, had a relapse and gradually sank until the end came on the above date.

The funeral service on May 26th was largely attended, and was conducted by Rev. F. E. Boothroyd, assisted by Rev. E. A. Lancaster, of Milton, Mr. Boothroyd, speaking from the words "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord," emphasized the strong faith of the deceased and his trust in his Redeemer.

The hymns sung, "Forever With the Lord," "The Lord's my Shepherd," and "The Sands of Time are Sinking" were favorites chosen by the departed.

He leaves to mourn the loss of a loving father, three daughters and two sons, Mary, Mrs. Earle MacRae, Brookfield; Ella, Mrs. Frank Mitchell, North Wiltshire; John, Hampshire; Bertie, Mrs. Franklin Sanderson, North River, and George at home. Also three sisters, Mrs. John Edwards, North Wiltshire; Mrs. Thomas Easton, Hampshire; and Miss Bessie Clark, North Wiltshire.

He was laid to rest in the cemetery at North Wiltshire beside his wife, who predeceased him 12 years ago. The pall bearers were, How-

MRS. JAMES R. ST. JOHN

The death of Mrs. James R. St. John of Souris, came as a painful surprise to her friends. The deceased, who was in her 54th year, had been in ill health for only a month and her condition was not considered as serious. But despite medical attention and nursing she passed to her final reward on May 24th. She will be remembered as a woman of Christian character—ever willing to assist friends and neighbors in time of trouble. She was a faithful attendant of St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church and during her illness was frequently visited by the clergy. On the evening after her death the Knights of Columbus paraded in a body to her home and prayers were said by Rev. Fr. Murray.

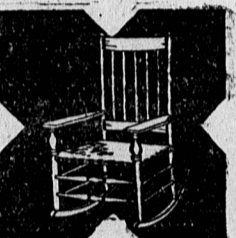
