The close vicinity of the "diggers" is a veritable hive of industry. The teams radiating in all directions, emulate the attributes of busy bees; except that in this case, the "bees" are carrying their loads away from the hive. The tone, however, is good. The haulers and the men who are handling the lifting tools are generally in their best cheer, although "lifting" is a rather laborious portion of the work, but the lifters realize a fair stipend for a good days lifting, and that in itself is an incentive to cheerful. It is a case of wresting riches from the forces of nature just like working a "paystreak" in placer diggings. It is a game where everyone playing makes a "pinch"—hence the cheerfulness. The farmers about 200 per cent. on their investment in increased crops on account of the oyster mud digging land. On Richmond Bay many diggers are at work on the big bed of Beach Point, and so accurate are some of the men in taking "landmarks," that they can cut a hole in the ice, put their digger in position, and start digging in the old "cut" from which they dug in New London. The men interested have cut out a hexagonal field of ice 150 yards in its widest part and 190 yards in its longest, and floated it on the open oyster bed at Fitzsimons' Point, thereby making a place for six digging machines. 


