Weekly Livestock Market

OTTAWA, CANADA DECEMBER 17, 1942

Strong cattle markets again were the rule throughout Canada during the past week and prices of nearly all classes of cattle moved up 25c. to 50c. Western Canada showed the greatest advance due to a strong demand to fill eastern orders. Calves were also higher, particularly at Toronto where the paying price was 50c. up, and hogs were also a shade higher, and lambs were firm sellers, throughout the country.

EASTERN CATTLE MARKETS

Cattle prices were strong to 25c. higher at TORONTO, with weighty steers making a top of \$11.85, several loads at \$11.75, and butcher steers and heifers \$10.25 to \$11.25. Stockers moved up, however, at \$8 to 10.50. Prices on all live stock were steady to 25c. higher at MONTREAL where good steers made \$11 to \$11.60, and an odd \$11.75. Good butcher steers were mostly \$7.75 to \$9, with a top of \$9.25. There was no change in the situation in the MARITIMES. Medium to choice steers were quoted from \$9.75 to \$10.25.

WESTERN CATTLE MARKETS

Lighter receipts at WINNIPEG forced buyers to pay higher prices at this week, and all killing cattle were 25c. higher, with some sales as much as 50c. better. Eastern demand was good and a fair number of killing steers brought \$10 to \$11, with one lot of heavyweights topping at \$11.65. Action on replacement cattle, however, was rather restricted, but some fairly good steers moved out at \$9.50 to \$8. Trade was active at CALGARY, and good to choice butcher steers were taken at \$10.50 to \$11, while EDMONTON also had a brisk trade and the bulk of the good to choice steers rated \$10 to 10.50, with a few choice at \$10.65. REGINA continued strong, with best steers to a top of \$10.25.

UNITED STATES MARKET

Exports to the United States during the week consisted of 847 dairy cattle compared with 407 the same week last year. Exports to date this year, with corresponding figures for 1941 in brackets, were: beef cattle 121,195 (156,887); dairy cattle 24,033 (21,291); and calves 53,878 (69,243).

CALF MARKET FIRMER

With a good demand, calf prices moved to higher levels, and Toronto was up 50c. at \$16 to \$18 for choice veals, while Montreal paid \$15.50 to \$16 for the best on offer. Markets in the west were also good, and Winnipeg reported a price of \$13 to \$14 for top veals; Calgary \$10 to \$11; Edmonton \$11 to \$12; and Regina \$12.

HOGS STEADY TO FIRMER

The hog market took on added strength, with Toronto paying \$16.60 to \$16.75 for the basic grade, and Montreal \$16.60 to \$16.65. Winnipeg continued on a basis of \$15.35. Calgary, however, was higher at \$15.25; and Edmonton remained unchanged at \$15.25. Regina was \$15.25 to \$15.30; and in the maritimes the basic price was \$16.60.

LAMB PRICES AGAIN HIGHER

The price paid for lambs again showed firmness, and good ewes and wethers sold at \$13.75 to \$14 at Toronto. Montreal had medium to good lambs at \$13.50, while Winnipeg carried a firmer undertone, with good lambs mostly \$12.50. Calgary was on a basis of \$11.50 to \$12; Edmonton \$11 to \$12; Regina \$11; and Moncton \$11 alive, or \$9.50 for grade A-1 dressed.

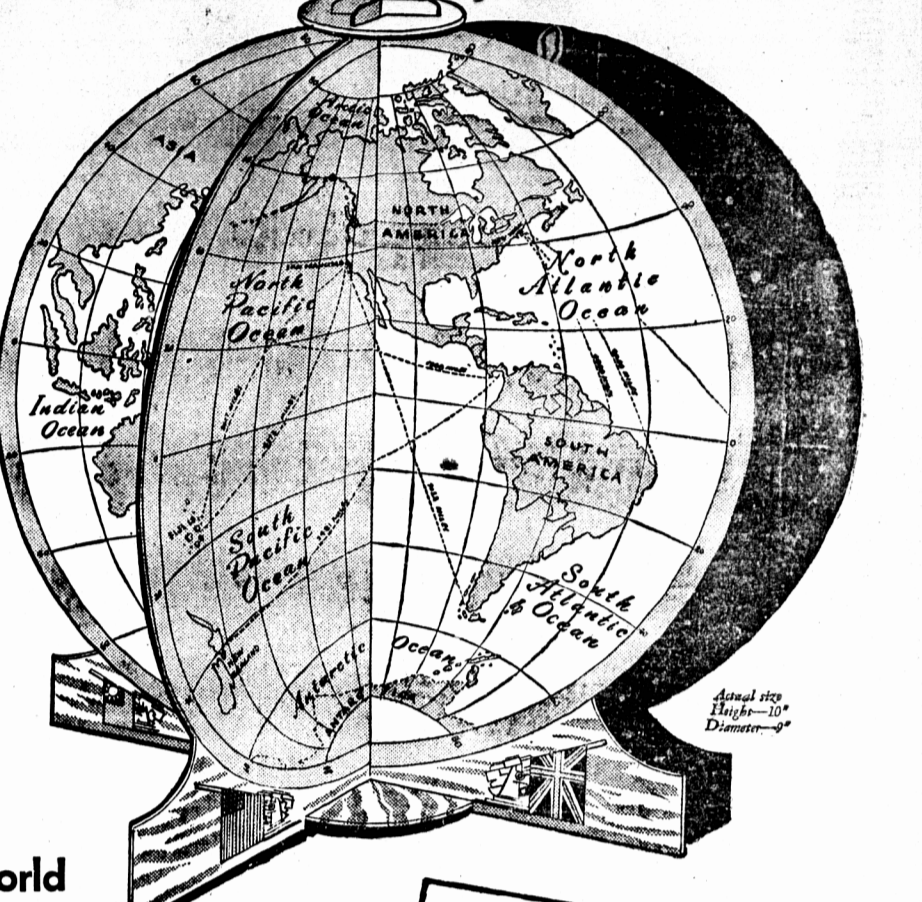

In Memoriam

ROBERTA JANE MacGREGOR

A pall of sadness was cast over the entire community when it became known that Mr. and Mrs. Stewart MacGregor, East Baltic, had suffered the loss of one of their twin babies, Roberta Jane, on December 10th, aged 18 months. Leaving the twins in the kitchen, after taking every precaution against fire or accident, the mother went out to attend to a few chores returning as quickly as possible. Upon her return she found Roberta on the floor with her clothing burned. And as was discovered later her body and face severely scorched. How it happened is still a grave mystery.

Medical aid was immediately sought, but no Doctor was available. Willard Ching, R.N., was summoned and gave all the assistance possible to alleviate the suffering infant, but in three hours the little one had passed on.

Their many friends sympathize deeply with them in their hour of sorrow and loss. Service was held at the home on Dec. 12th, and was largely attended. Rev. H.R. Bell spoke words of comfort and hope to the grief-stricken parents, relatives and friends.

The hymns were "Jesus loves me and 'Jewels', Mrs. Seldon MacLean and Mr. Bell sang "Near to the heart of God". Besides the parents, three children survive. Two sisters, Jean and Sandra, and one brother, Ian.

Relatives were Lyman Rose, Olive Bruce, Foster Garret, Hugh Campbell, Colin D'xon had charge of the hearse. Interment in Kingsboro cemetery.
