THE MARKETS

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 14.—There
has been a general advance in prices
on the large eastern markets as a
result of the new special tariff
on imported eggs. This has oc-
curred not only in selling prices
but in the paying prices to ship-
pers. Toronto—Market firm. Deal-
ers reporting 50 ungraded eggs de-
livered extras 52, firsts 48, seconds
43, thirds to retailers fresh parties
61 to 63, firsts 56 to 58, seconds 42
to 43. Sales of fresh are being
made between dealers at 58, firsts
53, seconds 38 to 40, storage ex-
tras 50, firsts 47, seconds 42. Coun-
try shippers are paying producers
extras 46, firsts 40, seconds 30.
Montreal—This market has ad-
vanced sharply on storage prices.
Present prices of storage to retail-
ers extras 50 to 52, firsts 45 to 48,
seconds 42 to 45, fresh extras 60 to
65, firsts 55 to 56, pullet extras 50,
paying prices to country shippers
for ungraded eggs have advanced
to extras 55, firsts 51 to 42, pullet
extra 50 delivered. Edmonton—
Prices of fresh to retailers is ex-
tra 53, firsts 50 to 52. Vancouver
—There have been several enquir-
ies here for cars from the west
and the east. Three cars are
leaving this weekend, out at extras
38, firsts 36, seconds 34 (o.b.) and
two at extras 40, firsts 38, seconds
36. There has been no change on
prices to producers with dealers
still quoting for ungraded eggs de-
livered extras 33 to 35, firsts 31 to
34, pullet extras 29 to 31. St.
John—Receipts of fresh eggs are
fair with the market lower and de-
mand good. Prices to retailers
fresh extras 58, firsts 52, storage
extras 45, firsts 42.

MONTREAL, Que. Jan. 14.—A
moderate amount of business was
transacted in Manitoba spring
wheat with both united kingdom
and continent. Important demand
from local buyers for oat and
domestic market and sales of quite
a few cars were made for all rail
shipment from For. William. Tradi-
ng in spot supplies was quiet and
prices were unchanged. The de-
mand for spring and winter wheat
grades of flour was still of a lim-
ited character but the undertone to
the market was steady. The millfeed
market continued firm. The trade
in rolled oats was steady and prices
ruled firm. There was no further
change in local egg prices but the
undertone to the market was strong
and the indications were that there
would be another sharp advance in
the near future on account of the
increased duty imposed on sup-
plies coming strong from the United
States. The demand was good
and an active trade was done. The
receipts were 999 cases. The potato
market was quiet with an easy un-
der-tone. Car lots of Prince Edward
Island green mountains were quo-

ted at \$1.85 to \$1.90 per bag of 90
lbs. and Quebec white stock at \$1.50
per bag of ninety pounds in bulk
extract. The butter trade was ex-
tremely dull but values were firm.
No 1 pasteurized was quoted at 41
to 41.2 cents per pound. The re-
ceipts were 24 packages. The fea-
ture of the cheese trade was the
improved demand from English im-
porters and a fair trade was done.
The local demand was quiet but
prices were unchanged. Western
grades were quoted at 19 to 19.1-
c per pound. The receipts were 46
boxes.

ing out the Prohibition Act.
The Government has again placed
