LONDON, Oct. 25.—The Canadian Government will donate as its typical contribution to the new headquarters now being erected at Geneva for the International Labor Organization the doors for the main floor of the building; all to be made of Canadian wood. The British Government will spend \$4,000 decorating the room where the governing body will hold its sessions.

GIRL BOARDS SHIP AT CHERBOURG AND IS LOST EN ROUTE TO QUEBEC

MONTREAL, Oct. 25.—Police on both sides of the Atlantic to-day began to search for 13-year-old Jeanne Vant, whose inexplicable disappearance either in Cherbourg, where she is said to have boarded the Empress of Scotland, or on the liner itself, has caused her distracted father, who was at the dock in Quebec to meet her when the ship arrived, to appeal to the authorities.

Henri Vant, the father of the girl, who expected his daughter on the Empress, was told by the steamer's officers and immigration authorities that the child had not sailed from France, while a travel agency which was to have put her on board insisted that she had.

All the passenger lists that have arrived at Quebec and Montreal during the past few days have been searched, and the crews and officers questioned, but no trace has been obtained of the missing girl.

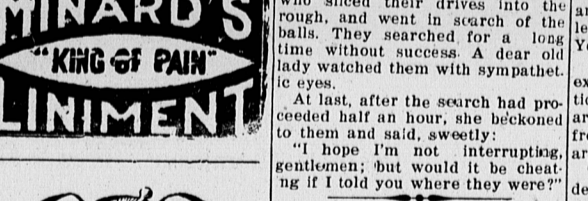

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—America's drug trade has reached a total volume of about \$800,000,000. It is estimated in a review prepared by a special committee of the National Wholesale Druggists' Association, and made public by Secretary Charles Harold Waterbury of New York.

Sources of this estimate, which exclude alkalies, such as confectionery and miscellaneous items, are: it is special taxes on proprietary medicines and dentifrices. "The number of druggists and dealers has risen from 6,139 'apothecaries and druggists' in 1850 to 49,000 'dealers in drugs and chemicals and pharmacists,' in 1924.

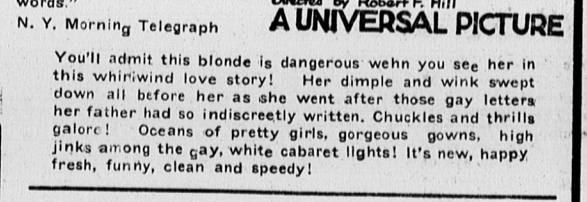
